AT the Court at Windsor Castle, the 19th day of January 1853,

CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

ELECTION and INVESTITURE of the DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND and the MARQUESS OF LONDONDERRY.

A Chapter of this Most Noble Order having been summoned for this day at two o'clock, the Knights Companions, hereafter named, assembled in St George's Hall, viz.—

The Marquess of Exeter, the Marquess of Salisbury, the Duke of Cleveland, the Marquess Camden, the Duke of Bedford, the Earl of Clarendon, and Earl Fitzwilliam, attended by the following Officers, viz.—

The Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate; the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor; Sir Charles George Young, Knt., Garter; and Sir Augustus William James Clifford, Bart., Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

The Knights Companions were called over by Garter, when (Her Majesty, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, and His Serene Highness the Prince of Leiningen, having passed into the Throne-room) they proceeded, together with the Officers of the Order, through the Grand Reception-room into the Throne-room.

The Sovereign being seated in her Chair of State, His Royal Highness Prince Albert at the table on the right, and His Serene Highness the Prince of Leiningen, on the left hand of Her Majesty, the other Knights Companions took their respective places at the table; the Prelate standing on the right, and the Chancellor on the left of the Sovereign; Garter and Black Rod at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter Her Majesty's royal will and pleasure that the vacant stalls in the Royal Chapel of St George, at Windsor, be filled; whereupon the Most Noble Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, was introduced to the Sovereign by Garter and Black Rod, and knighted with the sword of state; when His Grace, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election; and the suffrages having been collected by the Chancellor, were presented by him to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Most Noble Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, had been duly

elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Grace was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Earl of Clarendon and Earl Fitzwilliam, the two junior Knights Companions present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod. The Duke of Northumberland, kneeling near the Sovereign, Garter, on his knee, presented the Garter, and Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness the Prince Albert, buckled it on his Grace's left leg; the Chancellor pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the Ribband and George; and Her Majesty, assisted as before, put the same over his Grace's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. The Duke then again kissed Her Majesty's hand, and having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a second election, and the Chancellor, having collected the suffrages, presented them to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly did declare, that the Most Honourable Charles William, Marquess of Londonderry, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, had been duly elected a Knight of this Most Noble Order; whereupon his Lordship was introduced and invested with the Garter, Ribband, and George, with the like ceremonies.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by Her Majesty's command, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters-patent under Her royal sign manual and the great seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to grant unto the Most Noble Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, and the Most Honourable Charles William, Marquess of Londonderry, Knights of the said Most Noble Order, and duly

invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to Knights Companions of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if they had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

To Repeal the Export Duty on Cinnamon.

Whereas it is expedient that the duties of Customs chargeable on the exportation of Cinnamon from this Island should cease to be levied ; It is enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, that from and after the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, so much of the Ordinance, No. 9, of 1847, entitled “ For regulating the duties of Customs payable on goods imported into, and exported from this Island,” as enacts that the duties set forth in figures, in the table marked B, annexed to the said Ordinance, shall be raised, levied, and collected in respect of Cinnamon, upon the exportation thereof from this Island, shall be repealed ; and that from and after the said first day of July one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, the duties of Customs which are now levied and collected upon the exportation of Cinnamon from this Island, shall cease to be charged, levied, and collected.

TREASURY WARRANT.

Whereas by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled “ An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage,” certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled “ An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon and for other

purposes relating to the Post-office,” the proviso concerning the maximum weight of letters to be sent by post, as fixed in and by the said first-mentioned Act, is repealed ; and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk, or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by warrant under their hands, to fix a maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight, wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof ; and all letters are to be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such warrant, and also in conformity with, and under, and subject to all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct. And by the said Act power is also given to the Postmaster-General to collect and receive the Foreign and Colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to require the postage, British, Colonial, or Foreign, of any letters sent by the post, to be pre-paid, either in money or in stamps, as he may think fit, on the same being put into the Post-office ; and also, with such consent, to abolish or restrict the pre-payment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the pre-payment thereof to be in stamps, and to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made. And it is also declared and enacted that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, and any officer of the Post-office, to detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of that Act, or the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the said first-mentioned Act, and to open such letters and to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged, in either case, with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this warrant under our hands, order and direct that printed books, printed magazines, printed reviews, and printed pamphlets, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Island of Saint Helena, or posted in the said Island of Saint Helena, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and the said Island of Saint Helena, subject to the several regulations and rates hereinafter contained ; that is to say :—

On every packet consisting of a single printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall be sewed or bound together, if not exceeding half a pound in weight, there shall be charged

and taken one uniform rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of two shillings.

And on every such packet, if exceeding two pounds, and not exceeding three pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of three shillings.

And for every additional one pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of three pounds, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of postage of one shilling, and every fraction of such additional pound shall be charged as an additional pound.

And we further order and direct that no such packet, if containing more than one printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any paper or thing besides a printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall not be sewed or bound together, or which packet, in length, or breadth, or width, or depth, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, or twenty-four inches, shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid.

And we further order and direct that as to any packet hereinbefore authorised to be sent by the post under the provisions aforesaid, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall in every case be pre-paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper British postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto; which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this warrant; and as to any such packet posted in the Island of Saint Helena, the postage thereof shall in every case be pre-paid, either in money, or by the proper Colonial postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto at the time of the same being posted.

And we further order and direct that every such packet shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and shall contain printed matter only, with the binding thereof, and there shall be no writing or marks upon the cover or envelope thereof, or upon or within any part of the contents thereof, other than the name and address of the person to whom the packet shall be sent.

And in order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, we further direct that it shall be lawful for any officer of the Post-office in the United Kingdom to delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post, under the provisions of this warrant, for the space of twenty-four hours from the time at which (or at his option until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which) the same ought otherwise to have been forwarded by him.

And we further direct that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to interfere with or affect the transmission by the post of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of

printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures, nor of printed papers or other printed publications which are allowed to pass by the post under the newspaper privilege.

And we further order and direct that if any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this present warrant, shall contain any paper or thing besides a printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, and the binding thereof, or shall have any writing or marks upon the same, or upon the cover or envelope thereof, except the name and address of the person to whom it is forwarded, or shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall in length, or breadth, or width, or depth, exceed the dimensions of two feet or twenty-four inches, or shall contain more than one printed book, or printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, or shall contain any printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall not be sewed or bound together, or if the postage of any such packet, posted in the United Kingdom, shall not be duly and properly pre-paid by British stamps when posted, or if the postage of any such packet posted in the Island of Saint Helena, shall not be duly and properly pre-paid in money, or by Colonial stamps, when posted, the same shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet, on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter.

And we further direct that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any packets sent through any Foreign Country to which a transit rate of postage would be payable thereon, nor to any packets sent by private ships.

And we further order and direct that the term "by the post," used in this Warrant, shall, as to the sea conveyance, include the conveyance by packet-boat; and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

And we further direct that this Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three.

Provided lastly, and we do hereby declare and direct that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

Port of Portsmouth.

Appointment of Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby,

under the authority of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the places hereinafter mentioned, within the Port of Portsmouth, to be legal quays for the lading and unlading of goods; and we do hereby declare the extent of such quays to be as follows, that is to say:—

All that open place, quay, or wharf, called the Outer Camber Wharf, within the borough of Portsmouth, in the county of Southampton, being the property of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough, being in length, from the wall at the west end thereof to the angle near the swivel-bridge, four hundred and ninety-three feet, and varying in breadth from ninety-one feet at the west end thereof (excluding the space occupied by the stairs,) to forty-three feet at the east end thereof, near the said bridge; also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, being a continuation of the quay or wharf last mentioned, which proceeds across the foot of west end of the said swivel bridge, in a south-westwardly direction, to the extent of three hundred and ten feet, until it terminates at the hard beach of the Inner Camber; the said last-mentioned quay or wharf varying throughout in breadth from forty feet at the widest part thereof to twenty-four feet to the narrowest part thereof.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, called the Inner Camber Wharf, at Portsmouth aforesaid, being the property of and in the occupation of the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, being in length five hundred and fifty-three feet from the landing-stairs adjoining the Custom-house, to a point opposite the Hospital, at the Camber Bastion, and adjoining the slip-way on the Inner Camber for the repairs of vessels; the said open quay or wharf last mentioned being in breadth, from the quay wall to the quay gate, one hundred and sixty-two feet, and being in breadth between the walls, at the widest part, eighty-five feet, and breadth measured at the angles sixty-eight feet, and between the walls and the bastion is of an uniform breadth of thirty-two feet, but excluding, nevertheless, from the privilege of a legal quay, the wharfinger's house and offices upon the Inner Camber Wharf.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Portsmouth aforesaid, called the Customs Quay, the property of Her said Majesty, and in the occupation of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, which is of a triangular figure, and in length, in front of the said Custom-house, two hundred and six feet, on the south-west side thereof, one hundred and fifty-eight feet, and a small part of the south side thereof, facing the landing-stairs, being thirteen feet in length; on the north-east side thereof one hundred and thirty-five feet, then turning north, forty feet, and again turning eastward twelve feet, where it adjoins the mast-house, reserving, nevertheless, to Her said Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in consideration of the contiguity of the said last-mentioned quay to Her Custom-house, full right and power, at all times, to prevent access to and from the said quay, as the said Commissioners of Customs may, by an order in writing, direct or appoint.

And We, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby annul all former legal quays set out and appointed within the said limits of the said Port.

Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the following place, within the Port of Teignmouth, to be a legal quay for the lading and unlading of goods; and we do hereby declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as follows; that is to say:—all that open place, quay, or wharf, at Teignmouth aforesaid, commonly called or known as the Old Quay, except so much as forms the site of the stores and other buildings on the said quay, being in length on the north side thereof two hundred and forty feet, on the south side thereof one hundred and eighty-five and a-half feet, at the east end thereof one hundred and sixty-five feet, and at the west or river end thereof one hundred and twenty feet.

Port of Arundel.

Limits of Port and Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Arundel to be a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said Port shall commence at the most eastern point of the parish of Heene, in the county of Sussex, and thence along the coast of the said county, and up the river Arun, to the north side of Arundel Bridge; from thence, southwards, including the said river, to the mouth thereof, and so, westwardly, along the coast to Bosham Creek; and thence up, and including the said creek, to the most western part of the parish of Bosham, in the said county, being the eastern limit of the Port of Portsmouth; and shall extend seaward to a distance of three miles from low water-mark, and include all islands, rivers, bays, harbours, and creeks, within such limits respectively.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby appoint the following places within the said Port of Arundel to be legal quays for the lading and unlading of goods, and do hereby declare the extent of the said quays to be as follows; that is to say:—

All that open place, quay, or wharf, extending from the said river Arun to the common highway, and being in length on the south side thereof seventy-two feet, on the north side thereof sixty-nine feet nine inches, on the east side thereof thirty-six feet, and on the west side thereof seventy-four feet, and now in the occupation of the mayor and burgesses of Arundel aforesaid.

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, situate at Appledram, near Chichester, in the county of Sussex, being in length, from north to south, on the west side thereof, seventy-eight feet; from east to west, on the south side thereof, sixty feet; and on the north side thereof, thirty-nine feet; bounded on all sides, except the eastern, by the

water of Bosham Creek, and on the eastern by a road leading to Chichester.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby annul all former limits of the said Port of Arundel, and all former legal quays set out and appointed within the same.
