“Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and
“for regulating the Appointment of Vestry
“Clerks,’ shall be applied to, and put in
“force within this parish, as regards the
“appointment of a Vestry Clerk.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said
parish have made their application in writing to
the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above Resolu-
tion.

Now therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board,
under the authority of the several Statutes in that
behalf made and provided, do hereby order and
direct :—

ART. 1. That so much of the said Act passed
in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty,
as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk,
shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force
within the said parish of Minchinhampton.

ART. 2. That a copy of this Order shall be pub-
lished in the London Gazette.
