Legal Quays.

WE, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years, of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the following places, within the Port of Leith, to be legal quays for the lading, and unlading, of goods; and we do hereby declare the extent of such quays to be as follows; that is to say:—All that open place, quay or wharf, known as part of the east quay of Leith Harbour, commencing at a point five hundred and thirty feet northwards of the lower drawbridge, being the northernmost limit of the said quay already legalized, and extending from the said point in a northerly direction to the steps at the south end, ascending towards the east breakwater five hundred and forty feet; from thence in a south-easterly direction two hundred and sixty-four feet, and from thence in a westerly direction one hundred and eighty-one feet or thereabouts.

Also all those other quays or wharves at Leith aforesaid, which surround the new or Victoria Dock.

Also all those other places, quays, or wharves at Leith aforesaid, called or known as the Railway Timber Arching and New West Breakwater, leading from the said Victoria Dock to Low Water Pier, and being in length two thousand six hundred and two feet, or thereabouts.

And also all that other open place, quay, or wharf at Leith aforesaid, commonly called or known as Low Water Pier, being in length five hundred and twenty-one feet, or thereabouts.
