CEREMONIAL observed at the Baptism of His Royal Highness Prince Leopold George DUNCAN ALBERT, Fourth Son of HER MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY and HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE ALBERT, on Tuesday the 28th of June 1853, in the Chapel within Buckingham-Palace.

THE Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and others invited to the Solemnity, assembled in the Old Dining-Room, at Buckingham-Palace, at Six o'Clock, and soon after their arrival were conducted to seats provided for them in the Chapel.

Her Majesty The Queen, and The other Royal Personages, having taken their Seats, the Great Officers of the Household, the Mistress of the Robes, the Lord of the Bedchamber to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, officiating for the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness, with the Vice-Chamberlain, and the Lord and Groom in Waiting to The Queen, and the Lord and Groom of the Bedchamber to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, took their places near The Queen and His Royal Highness.

The Treasurer and the Comptroller of the Household took their places behind the Sponsors.

Others of the Household, the Officers of Arms, and the Attendants upon The Royal Family, together with the Suites of The Royal Personages present, arranged themselves on either side of the Chapel.

The Service then commenced with the performance of Sacred Music.

When the Music had ceased, The Lord Chamberlain, accompanied by the Lord of the Bedchamber to His Royal Highness Prince Albert, officiating for the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness, conducted the Infant Prince into the Chapel, His Royal Highness being carried by the Head Nurse, and attended by the Lady Caroline Barrington.

The Lady Caroline Barrington handed The Infant Prince to the Archbishop, and received The Prince from His Grace when He had been baptised.

After the Baptismal Service, His Royal Highness The Infant Prince was re-conducted from the Chapel in the same way.

The Ceremonial concluded with the performance of Sacred Music.

As soon as the Ceremony was concluded, Her Majesty, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, The Sponsors, The Royal Personages, with their respective Attendants, and the Visitors, retired from the Chapel in the same order of Procession as they came, and proceeded up the Grand Staircase,—Her Majesty and The other Royal Personages entering the Throne Room,—the remainder of the Company assembling in the Green Drawing-Room.

Her Majesty was conducted, at eight o'clock, to the Banquet in the Picture Gallery, accompanied by The Royal Family, the Foreign Ministers, the Cabinet Ministers, and the other Persons who attended the Ceremonial,—the Band playing "God save the Queen."

After the Banquet, the Lord Steward gave the following Toasts; viz:-

The Queen then rose from the Banquet and proceeded to the White Drawing Room, accompanied by Her Majesty The Queen of Hanover, Her Royal Highness The Princess of Prussia, Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Gloucester, Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Kent, Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cambridge, Her Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, Her Royal Highness The Princess Mary of Cambridge, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, Her Royal Highness the Duchess Caroline of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, Her Serene Highness The Princess Adelaide of Hohenlohe-Langenburg, and the other Ladies present. Soon after which, His Royal Highness Prince Albert, His Majesty The King of Hanover, His Royal Highness The Prince of Prussia, His Royal Highness The Duke of Cambridge, His Royal Highness The Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, His Royal Highness The Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, His Serene Highness The Prince Edward of Saxe-Weimar, His Serene Highness The Prince of Hohenlohe-Langenburg, and the other Guests, proceeded to the Music Room, when the Doors of the White Drawing Room were opened, and The Queen received an Evening Party, at which other Persons attended in addition to those who were present at the Ceremonial and Banquet.

The Gentlemen-at-Arms lined the approaches to, and the entrance of, the Chapel. The Yeomen of the Guard were stationed in the Grand Hall of the Palace, in the Passages leading from the Old Dining Room to the approach to the Chapel, and upon the Grand Staircase.

The Knights of the several Orders present at the Solemnity wore their respective Collars.

The Foreign Ministers, Cabinet Ministers, and other Visitors, appeared in full-dress Uniform.

#### WESTMINSTER, June 28, 1853.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that The Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting to Her Majesty duties on profits arising from property, professions, trades, and offices.

An Act to make further provision for staying execution of judgment for misdemeanors upon giving bail in error.

An Act for the better regulation of metropolitan stage and hackney carriages, and for prohibiting

the use of advertizing vehicles.

An Act to amend an Act passed in the fifth ear of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, for granting certain powers and authorities to the Australian Agricultural Company, and to alter the capital of the said Company.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Great Northern Railway Company, to authorise an increase of capital, and for other purposes.

An Act for better supplying with water the town or village of Bacup, and the neighbourhood thereof, in Lancashire.

An Act to authorise the creation of preference stock by the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway Company, in lieu of debentures, and the reduction, division, and consolidation into stock of the Manchester and Lincoln Union Shares of the said railway.
