THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Alexandria, announcing that vessels arriving in Egypt from Syria are admitted to immediate pratique.
