WE, taking into Our most serious consideration, the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our arms, both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Public Day of Humiliation and Prayer be observed throughout that part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of April instant, that so both We and Our people may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of Our sins, and in the most devout and solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our arms for the Restoration of Peace to Us and Our Dominions: and We do strictly charge and command, that the said day be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation:

Our will is, therefore, and We charge, that, this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in Our name and authority, make publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance: And Our will and pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We do appoint them to send copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their bounds, that, upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

WE, taking into Our most serious consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Public Day of Humiliation and Prayer be observed throughout those parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednesday the twenty-sixth day of April instant, that so both We and Our people may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of Our sins, and in the most devout and solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our arms for the Restoration of Peace to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said day be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation: And, for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Public Worship, and to take care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

BUCKINGHAM-PALACE, April 11, 1854.

This day had audience of Her Majesty:— Rear-Admiral Virgin, of the Royal Swedish Navy, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, to deliver his credentials:

To which he was introduced by the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Major-General the Honourable Sir Edward Cust, K.C.H. Her Majesty's Master of the Ceremonies.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable
Privy Council.

The Lords of the Council having taken into consideration certain applications for leave to export arms, ammunition, military and naval stores, &c., being articles of which the exportation is prohibited by Her Majesty's Proclamation of February eighteenth, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four; their Lordships are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that permission should be granted by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to export the articles so prohibited to be carried coastwise to ports in the United Kingdom, and likewise to all places in North and South America, except the Russian possessions in North America; to the coast of Africa, West of the Straits of Gibraltar, and round the South and East coast of Africa; to the whole coast of Asia not within the Mediterranean Sea or the Persian Gulf, and not being part of the Russian Territories; to the whole of Australia, and to all British colonies within the limits aforesaid, upon taking a bond from the persons exporting such prohibited articles that they shall be landed and entered at the port of destination; and that all further permission to export such articles to other parts of the World be only granted upon application to the Lords of the Council at this Board.

For many years we have enjoyed the blessings of Peace, which have carried in their train National prosperity, and developed in all countries art and science, commerce and civilization.

Our Prayers are offered in confidence, though with deep humility, to the Supreme Disposer of Events for the success of the Allied Forces in restoring and maintaining the Peace of the World.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received the following Notice to Mariners, issued by the United States Lighthouse Board.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

*Light-Vessel off the Frying-Pan Shoals,
Cape Fear, N. C.*

A LIGHT-VESSEL will be placed, during the month of April next, off the southern extremity of the Frying-Pan Shoals.

Two lights (each produced by eight lamps and parabolic reflectors) will be shown from this vessel, at an elevation of about 40 feet above the level of the sea. This vessel has two masts—is about 100 feet long—250 tons, and the top of the gunwale about 10 feet from the water line.

The hull is painted yellow, with "Frying-Pan Shoals" in large black letters on both sides. The lower masts are painted yellow—the top masts white, with an open work oval day mark, five feet in diameter, painted black, at an elevation of about 55 feet above the water line.

This vessel will be placed in 9 or 10 fathoms water, at the distance of about 19 nautical miles from Bald Head Lighthouse, and about 23 nautical miles from the Federal Point Lighthouse, off the southern extremity of the Shoals making out in about a S.S.E. direction from Cape Fear.

The following magnetic bearings will show the approximate position of this vessel:—

From Light-vessel to Bald Head Lighthouse,
N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

From Light-vessel to Federal Point Lighthouse,
N. by W.

From Light-vessel to centre of outer breakers,
N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

The southern extremity of the breakers, with only 10 feet of water upon them, will be about 4 nautical miles inside of the position of the vessel. A shoal spot with 16 feet water on it will bear about N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., distant about 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles, and another shoal spot with 18 feet of water on it, will bear about N. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., distant 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles from the vessel.

The soundings to the eastward of the position of this Light-vessel will be found to be in general gradual and uniform, from 10 to about 6 fathoms before deepening, after crossing the outer extremity of the Shoal in the vicinity of the Light-vessel; and the soundings to the westward gradually deepening from the vicinity of the vessel, from 9 and 10 to 15, 17, &c., fathoms.

Sailing vessels of heavy draught should not be run in bad weather into less than 15 to 18 fathoms water in passing these Shoals. Steamers and small sail vessels may be run with safety, under ordinary circumstances of weather, on the line, East and West, upon which the Light-vessel will be placed.

Notice will be given of the precise time at which this Light-vessel will be placed in her position and the lights exhibited, accompanied by correct bearings and distances, and the approximate latitude and longitude.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board
a Report from the General Board of Health,
dated the twenty-eighth day of March one
thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the
words following; that is to say:—

¶ To The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"We, the General Board of Health, appointed for
the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,'
have, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon
the Petition of not less than one-tenth of the in-
habitants rated to the relief of the poor of and
within the township of Crumpsall, in the parish
of Manchester (Union of Prestwich), in the
county palatine of Lancaster, (the same being
a place having a known and defined boundary,
the number of the said petitioners greatly exceed-
ing thirty in the whole,) directed Robert Raw-
linson, a Superintending Inspector appoint-
ed for the purposes of the said Public Health
Act, to visit the said township, and to make
inquiry, and to examine witnesses as to the
sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the
state of the burial-grounds, the number and
sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any
local Acts of Parliament in force within such
township for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching,
regulating, supplying with water, or improving the
said township, or having relation to the purposes of
the said Public Health Act, also as to the natural
drainage areas, and the existing municipal, paro-
chial, and other local boundaries, and the bound-
aries which might be most advantageously adopted
for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having
previously given the notices directed by the said
Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said in-
quiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath
reported in writing to the said Board upon the
said several matters with respect to which he was
directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters
with respect to which he deemed it expedient to
report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said Report, accompanied
by a notice stating that written statements might
be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any
matter contained in or omitted from the said Re-
port, or any amendment proposed to be made
therein, have been duly published and deposited,
as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the
time for forwarding such statements has now
elapsed, and the statements which have been
received by the said Board have been duly depos-
ited as required by that Act;

"And it appears by the said Report that there
is no local Act of Parliament in force within the
said township for paving, lighting (otherwise than
for the profit of proprietors or shareholders),
cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with
water, or improving such township, or any part
thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of
the said Public Health Act;

"Now therefore, we, the said General Board
of Health, do hereby, in pursuance of the said Public
Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty that
it appears to us to be expedient that—

"1. 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' and
every part thereof, except the section numbered
50 in the copies of that Act, printed by your
Majesty's printers, should be applied to and be
in force within and throughout the entire area,
places, and parts of places comprised within the

boundaries of the said township of Crumpsall, in
the parish of Manchester, in the county palatine
of Lancaster, and that such area, places, and parts
of places should be and constitute a district for
the purposes of the said Public Health Act
accordingly.

"2. The Local Board of Health to be elected
under the said Public Health Act should consist
of nine persons, and that the entire number
should be elected for the whole of the said district.

"3. The first election of the said Local
Board should take place on the twenty-fifth day of
May in the year of our Lord one thousand
eight hundred and fifty-four.

"4. One-third in number of the said Local
Board of Health should go out of office on the thirty-
first day of March in each year subsequently to
that in which the said first election of that Local
Board takes place; but in case the day so appoint-
ed should fall on a Sunday, or on a day appoint-
ed for public fast or thanksgiving, then that, such
one-third, should go out of office on the day next
following.

"5. Every person at the time of his election
as member of the said Local Board, and so long
as he shall continue in office by virtue of such elec-
tion, should be resident, as in the said 'Public Health
Act, 1848,' is required, and be seized or possessed
of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or
amount of not less than one thousand pounds, or
should be so resident and rated to the relief of the
poor of some parish, township, or place, of which
some part is within the said district, upon an an-
nual value of not less than thirty pounds;

"6. At the first election of the said Local
Board, Edward William Binney, of Crumpsall,
should perform the duties which it may be requisite
for him to perform in conducting the said first
election; and in case the said Edward William
Binney, from illness or other sufficient cause, should
be unable to discharge such duties, or should be
absent, or should refuse to act, then Henry Charle-
wood, of Crumpsall, should perform such of the
said duties as then remain to be performed.

"7. The fourteen days' notice of qualifica-
tion required by 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' to
be given by owners of property, in order to entitle
them to vote at the said first election, should be
given to the said Edward William Binney, at his
residence, No. 3, Bank Terrace, Cheetham Street,
Crumpsall; or in case he should refuse, or be
unable to receive the same, then to the said
Henry Charlewood, at his residence, Crumpsall
Crescent, within the aforesaid township of Crump-
sall.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, having taken
the said Report into consideration, is pleased to
approve thereof, and by and with the advice of

pursuance of "The Public Health Act, 1848," order
and direct that—

1. From and after the date of this Order,
"The Public Health Act, 1848," and every part
thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the

copies of that Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said township of Crumpsall, in the parish of Manchester, in the county palatine of Lancaster, and that such area, places, and parts of places shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. The Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act shall consist of nine persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. The first election of the said Local Board shall take place on the twenty-fifth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

4. One-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. Every person at the time of his election as a member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, shall be resident, as in the said "Public Health Act, 1848," is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than one thousand pounds, or shall be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than thirty pounds.

6. At the first election of the said Local Board, Edward William Binney, of Crumpsall, shall perform the duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting the said first election; and in case the said Edward William Binney, from illness or other sufficient cause, shall be unable to exercise or discharge such duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then Henry Charlewood, of Crumpsall, shall perform such of the said duties as then remain to be performed.

7. The fourteen days' notice of qualification required by "The Public Health Act, 1848," to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said Edward William Binney, at his residence, No. 3, Bank Terrace, Cheetham Street, Crumpsall; or in case he should refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to Henry Charlewood, at his residence, Crumpsall Crescent, within the aforesaid district of Crumpsall.
