The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, enclosing copy of a French Imperial Decree, modifying, as follows, the duties on the importation of the articles below mentioned into the American and Indian possessions of France.

1.—Martinique and Guadeloupe.

Merchandise brought from Pondicherry, and from the other Indian possessions of France, in French vessels :—

Indian cloths :

Cotton cloths, bleached or unbleached, and denominated *Conjoas* or *Salempoor* ; blue calico, denominated *Saudrecaux* ; check cloths and handkerchiefs, denominated *Burgos* ; trousers and shirts of coarse cloth, and used as clothing for negroes or coolies ; sail cloth—20f. per cent., ad valorem.

2.—Articles of merchandise brought from any country whatsoever :—

Animals for breeding :

Bulls, cows, heifers, rams, sheep, sows—free.

Tobacco :

In leaf, 60f. per 100 kilogs.

Prepared, 120f. per 100 kilogs.

Vanilla :

In French ships, 5f. per 100 kilogs.

In Foreign ships, 10f. per 100 kilogs.

Isle of Reunion (Bourbon).

Vanilla :

In French ships, 10f. per 100 kilogs.

In Foreign ships, 15f. per 100 kilogs.

The articles specified under the first head will, when imported from the home entrepôts, in French ships, into the colonies of Martinique and Guadeloupe, enjoy a reduction of one-fifth of the duties designated.
