Board of Trade, Whitehall,

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Genoa, reporting that the following Quarantine Regulations have been adopted at that port with regard to vessels arriving from the East.

1st. All vessels arriving from the Levant, whether sailing ships or steamers, on touching at any port in the Royal States, are subject to quarantine.

2d. When the passage shall have been healthy, and there shall not exist on board at the time of arrival any sick or convalescent, the quarantine shall be one of simple observation for the period of five complete days, with cleansing and airing of all effects.

3d. If the passage shall not have been free from sickness, or if there shall be sick on board, the quarantine will be strict, and of the duration of fifteen days, and may not be fulfilled except in the Lazaretto of Varignano, in the Gulf of Spezzia, for ships destined for the mainland, or in the Lazaretto of Cagliari for ships bound for the Island of Sardinia.

4th. In the strict quarantine the unloading and cleansing in the Lazaretto of the effects and susceptible merchandize will be obligatory.

5th. Ships of war and transports returning from the East, with troops for disembarkation and sick on board, will not be admitted to pratique, except in the Lazaretto of Varignano for the mainland, or in that of Cagliari for the Island of Sardinia, after having fulfilled in those Lazaretti all the conditions required by the existing regulations.
