THE following ADDRESSES having been presented to The Queen, Her Majesty has been pleased to receive the same very graciously :

To The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bradford, in the West Riding of the county of York, beg most humbly to present to your Majesty our hearty congratulations on the restoration of Peace.

While deploring the loss of the many gallant men who have fallen in battle, and the sufferings endured with such exemplary patience by others who have survived, our own and the National grief is assuaged by the reflection that the horrors and sacrifices of the War have only served to exhibit more conspicuously the feeling of attachment to their Sovereign and their Country which has pervaded all ranks, and to prove to the world that the indomitable spirit of the British people has neither been lost nor enervated by the long previous interval of European peace, and that, though the Country was unprepared in the outset of the struggle, its immense resources have not been strained or impaired by the vast requirements of modern warfare, but have been developed in increasing and unexampled strength.

We hopefully anticipate that,—as the War was commenced and has been prosecuted with no desire for conquest or aggrandisement, and Peace has been concluded after successes disinterestedly achieved, and on terms settled in concert with Allies who have, in a destructive warfare, worthily shared the dangers and the honours of the armies and fleets of your Majesty,—our beloved Country and the other States of Europe may long be preserved from internal commotion or international strife.

While we would ever resist to the utmost any attack on the National honour and dignity, we observe with peculiar satisfaction that in the Treaty just concluded there is contained the germ of that wise and Christian principle by which, when differences arise among Nations, they shall be submitted to the consideration of some mediating power for adjustment before plunging into a state of hostility alike disastrous to the aggressor and the aggrieved.

The return of an honourable Peace will, we hope, conduce to the diffusion of religion, the extension of commerce, and the advancement of the arts and sciences (of which your Majesty and your Royal Consort have been, and are, the munificent patrons), and in the right enjoyment of these blessings, and possessing the aspirations of a free people, we trust that this Country, under the benignant rule of your Majesty, will maintain and advance its position amongst Nations, and be instrumental in spreading freedom and happiness throughout the world, and that your Majesty may be long spared to wield the sceptre of England over a free, enlightened, and prosperous people.

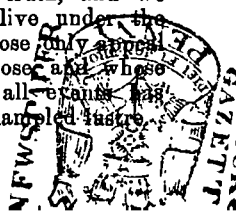
To The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.
