PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, upon a Representation of one of Her Principal Secretaries of State, that a copy of an Interlocutor of a Sheriff of a County in Scotland, under certain provisions of the said Act, has been received by him, in pursuance thereof to order that no new Burial Ground shall be opened within certain limits specified in such Order, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, or (as the case may require,) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, Burials within certain limits, or in certain Burial Grounds or Places of Burial, shall be Discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order; and such Order in Council shall thereupon have like force and effect as if the same were embodied in the said Act: Provided always, that notice of such Representation, and of the time it shall please Her Majesty to Order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be transmitted to the Crown Agent in Edinburgh, and the Sheriff-Clerk of the County in which such Burial Ground is situated, and the same shall be by them respectively published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and fixed on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parishes affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered;

And Whereas the Right Honorable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that he had received a copy of an Interlocutor pronounced by the Sheriff of the Sheriffdom of Dumbarton and Bute, setting forth certain proceedings had under the provisions of the said Act, and finding the allegations of a Petition presented to him by James Blair Risk, Merchant in Dumbarton, and fourteen other persons, (being all persons assessed for Relief of the Poor within the Parish of Dumbarton,) that the BURIAL GROUND of the Burgh and Parish of DUMBARTON was dangerous to health, and offensive or contrary to decency, to be proved; and the said Representation

recommended that no new Burial Ground should be opened within the said Burgh and Parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that Burials should be DISCONTINUED in the aforesaid Burial Ground;—

And Whereas Notice of the said Representation, and of the time when it pleased Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council, has been duly published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and has been fixed as required by the said Act;—

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new Burial Ground shall be opened in the Burgh and Parish of DUMBARTON without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that, from and after the 1st day of January 1857, Burials in the Burial Ground of the said Burgh and Parish shall be wholly DISCONTINUED: Provided, nevertheless, that this Order shall not affect a small piece of non-parochial ground situate on the east side of the above-mentioned Burial Ground, and separated therefrom by a high wall, and which ground was purchased in the year 1847 by Robert Napier, Engineer, of Glasgow, and Humphrey Walter Campbell, late Sheriff-Substitute of Dumbartonshire.
