THE Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by Letters-Patent under Her Royal Sign Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the Statutes and Regulations usually observed in regard to Installation, and to grant unto His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, Abdul Medjid, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the Ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if His Imperial Majesty had been formally installed; any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post office.

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Stamp Duties on Newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by certain Warrants in writing under their hands, bearing date respectively the 9th day of May 1843, the 27th day of December 1854, the 14th day of February 1855, and the 31st day of December 1855, did make and give certain orders, directions, and regulations relating to the transmission by the post of certain letters, newpapers, and other printed publications and papers, and also of certain packets consisting of printed newspapers, certain other packets consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, and certain other packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers therein respectively and hereinafter mentioned, from certain places to certain other places therein respectively and hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas a Treaty hath been lately entered into between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French, for regulating the communications by post between their respective dominions, and it is expedient, for the better carrying out of the same, that the said recited Warrants, bearing date respectively the 9th day of May 1843, the 27th day of December 1854, the 14th day of February 1855, and the 31st day of December 1855, should be repealed, and that certain other regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct that the said recited Warrants, bearing date respectively the 9th day of May 1843, the 27th day of December 1854, the 14th day of Fobruary 1855, and the 31st day of December 1855, be, and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, respectively, and that the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein respectively mentioned and set forth shall wholly cease and determine.

2. And we do further order and direct that every letter not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the Schedule A, to this Warrant annexed, addressed to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of such Schedule, may be transmitted by the post from any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said Schedule A, to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of such Schedule; and that all such respective letters shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained. And that the single rate of postage for the transmission thereof shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against the said countries and places respectively, in the said Schedule A; and that all such respective letters so transmitted, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

On every such letter so transmitted as afore-said, if not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedule A.

And on every such letter exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage, as follows, that is to say:—

On every such letter, if exceeding a quarter of an ounce and not exceeding half an ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding half an ounce and not exceeding three-quarters of an ounce in weight, three rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding threequarters of an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, four rates of postage.

And for every additional quarter of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of one ounce, there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional quarter of an ounce shall be charged as an additional quarter of an ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with, under this Warrant, if not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight.

3. And we do further order and direct that every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the Schedule B, to this Warrant annexed, addressed to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of such Schedule, may be transmitted by the post from any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said Schedule B, to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of such Schedule; and that all such respective letters shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained; and that the single rate of postage

for the transmission thereof shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against the said countries and places respectively, in the said Schedule B; and that all such respective letters so transmitted, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such letter so transmitted as aforesaid, if not exceeding half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedule B.

And on every such letter exceeding half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:—

On every such letter, if exceeding half of an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such letter, if exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage. And every fractional part of such additional ounce in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

4. And we do further order and direct that every letter (whatever may be the weight of it), posted in Spain, addressed to Gibraltar, and sent by the post to Gibraltar otherwise than by sea, shall be chargeable with a British rate of one penny.

5. And we do further order and direct that all packets consisting of printed newspapers posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the Schedule C to this Warrant annexed, may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said Schedule C; and that all such respective packets shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto, and that the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule C.

6. And we do further order and direct that all packets consisting of printed papers, other than newspapers, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the Schedule D to this Warrant annexed, may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said Schedule D. And that all such

respective last-mentioned packets shall be so transmitted, in conformity with, and under and sulject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto. And that the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule D.

7. And we do further order and direct that all such respective packets transmitted under the fifth and sixth clauses of this Warrant hereinbefore respectively contained, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said S hedules C and D respectively.

And on every such packet, exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight and not exceeding half a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half a pound in weight and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and a half in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and a half and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight, of any such packet, above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate, chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

8. And we do further order and direct that all packets consisting of printed newspapers and other printed papers, posted in any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the Schedule E, to this Warrant annexed, addressed to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of such last-mentioned Schedule, may be transmitted by the post from any of the countries and places mentioned and set in the said first column of the said Schedule E, to any of the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of such Schedule, and that all such respective last-mentioned packets shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, either free, or that the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule E, according as the words "free of British postage," or the said rate of postage shall be mentioned or set forth against the said places respectively, in such Schedule; and that all such respective packets, transmitted and chargeable with postage under this clause, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively, in the said Schedule E.

And on every such packet exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage, as follows; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding two ounces in weight and not exceeding four ounces in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight and not exceeding half of a pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half of a pound in weight and not exceeding one pound in weight, eight rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and a half in weight, twelve rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and a half and not exceeding two pounds in weight, sixteen rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding two ounces in weight.

9. And we do further order and direct that the several printed newspapers mentioned in the Schedule F, to this Warrant annexed, posted in the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of such Schedule, addressed to the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the said Schedule F, may be transmitted by the post from the countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said Schedule F to the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said Schedule F; and that all such respective newspapers shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto; and that the rate of postage for the transmission of every such newspaper shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule F.

10. And we do further order and direct that as to any letter hereinbefore, in the second clause of this Warrant, authorised to be sent by the post, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to France or Algeria, the postage thereof shall in every case be paid either in money or by being stamped with the proper British postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter, near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the

postage-duty payable thereupon, under or by virtue of this Warrant. And as to every such letter posted in France or Algeria, addressed to the United Kingdom, it is the intention that the postage thereof shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted; and if the postage of any such letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to France or Algeria, shall not be duly and properly paid, either in money or by British stamps, when posted, or if the postage of any such letter posted in France or Algeria, addressed to the United Kingdom, shall not be duly and properly paid when posted, every such letter shall be charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under the provisions of this Warrant if the postage thereof had been paid in money or stamps when posted. But if any such letter, posted in the United Kingdom addressed to France or Algeria, or posted in France or Algeria addressed to the United Kingdom, shall have thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, the amount of such stamp or stamps shall be allowed and deducted in charging the double postage thereon.

11. And we do further order and direct that as to any such letter hereinbefore, in the second clause of this Warrant, authorised to be sent by the post, which shall be posted in France or Algeria, addressed to Malta, or posted in Malta, addressed to France or Algeria, if the postage thereof shall not be duly and properly paid when posted, every such letter shall be charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under the provisions of this Warrant if the postage thereof had been paid when posted; and as to any such letter which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Post-offices, via France, or which shall be posted in any of the places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Post offices, addressed to the United Kingdom, viâ France; and as to any such letter which shall be posted in any of the places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Postoffices, addressed to Malta, or which shall be posted in Malta, addressed to any of the places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Post-offices, there shall be charged and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, the paid for the transmission thereof respectively, the single rate of paid or unpaid postage mentioned and set forth against the said countries and places respectively in the said Schedule A, according as the postage thereof shall be paid or unpaid upon any such letter when posted.

12. And we do further order and direct that as to any letter transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, to or from France or Algeria, or to or from Foreign countries via France, the rates of British postage imposed and payable on letters transmitted by packet-boat between Suez or Bassora, or any other port in the Red Sea or Persian Gulf, and any port in the East Indies, under or by virtue of the said recited Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, shall be no longer chargeable or payable thereupon.

13. And we do further order and direct that nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act passed in the fourth year of the reign

of Her present Majesty, nor to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers, employed in Her Majesty's Service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company, now by law enjoy, of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

14. And we do further order and direct that as to any letters, or printed newspapers, or other printed papers, which shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, to or from British North America, viâ the United States, any transit rates payable thereon to the United States' Government shall be charged and paid in addition to any rates of postage payable under this Warrant.

15. And we do further order and direct that every packet of printed newspapers and other printed papers, which shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained (that is to say):—

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same shall be registered by the proprietor or printer thereof, at the General Post-office in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication; and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

Every packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers which shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no word or communication printed on the contents of any such packet after the publication thereof, or upon any cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon any such contents or the cover thereof, other than and except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent. But the name or title of any newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, newsvender, or agent, by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof.

No packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers, transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, between the United Kingdom and France, Algeria, or the places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains Post-offices, shall in length, or width, or depth, exceed the dimensions of eighteen inches.

No packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers, transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any letteror communication, nor any enclosure other than printed newspapers or other printed papers.

Every packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers, transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the Post-office at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-Greneral may appoint.

Upon every packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers, transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage-duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall have a postage-account with the General Post-office in London, in which case the same shall be forwarded post-paid, and the postage thereof

shall be charged in such postage-account.

And upon every such packet which shall be posted in any of the British Colonies, or in

any Foreign Country, the postage thereof, with any transit rate payable thereon, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

16.
