2d June 1832, and of another Trust-Deed executed by his Heirs, and the Trustees named in the foresaid Trust-Disposition, dated 13th and 17th December 1851, and subsequent Deeds and Writs, and Infestments proceeding thereupon, and all other Parties having interest, or concerned for themselves or others, in the said Estate and Others, are hereby required to appear before the Right Honorable the Lord President of the Court of Session in Scotland, and the Honorable Lord Mackenzie, within the Robing-Room of the Judges in the Parliament House, Edinburgh, upon Saturday the 21st day of March next, at 10 o'clock A.M., when they will be heard for their interests and the interests of those for whom they may appear, in the matter of a Petition presented to the House of Lords in the present Session of Parliament by the Trustees who are now vested and seised in Trust in the said Estate of Scotsraig and Others, by virtue of the said Trust-Disposition dated 13th and 17th December 1851, and subsequent Deeds and Writs, and Infestments proceeding thereon, for leave to bring in a Bill to enable the said Trustees to Feu certain portions of the Lands and Estate of Scotsraig, with consent of the Liferentrix for the time being in possession thereof, and for making provision with respect to certain Feus of portions thereof already granted : Which Petition was, by Order of Reference dated the 16th day of February current, referred by the House of Lords to the said Judges, to summon all Parties before them who may be concerned in the said Bill, and to report to the House the state of the Case, with their opinion thereupon.

INTIMATION is Hereby Given, That His Grace WALTER FRANCIS, DUKE OF BUCCLEUGH and QUEENSBERRY, Heir of Entail in possession of the Earldom of Buccleuch, comprehending *inter alia* the Lands and Baronies of Branxholm, Eckford, Lempitlaw, and Others, the Lordship and Barony of Dalkeith, and the Lands and Barony of Sheriffhall and Others, and also Heir of Entail in possession of the Lands and Barony of Eastpark or Smeaton, lying in the Sheriffdom of Edinburgh, and the Lands of Nether-Newhall or Burnfoot, in the Sheriffdom of Roxburgh, and various other Lands, has presented a Petition to the Court of Session (First Division, Mr Lindsay, Clerk), in terms of the Act 11th & 12th Victoria, cap. 36, entitled 'An Act for the Amendment of the Law of Entail in Scotland,' praying to have it found and declared that the sum of L.8,718 : 9 : 11, consigned by the Edinburgh and Dalkeith Railway Company, and the North British Railway Company, for behoof of the Petitioner, and his Heirs of Entail, as the value of parts of his said Lands and Baronies required by the said Companies in the formation of their respective Railways, should be applied in repayment *pro tanto* of the sum of L.12,059 : 7 : 6, expended by the Petitioner in permanent Improvements on the said Entailed Lands and Baronies, as specified in the said Petition, and for authority to the Petitioner to uplift and apply the said consigned Money in repayment as aforesaid : On which Petition the Lords of the First Division have pronounced the following Interlocutor :—' *Edinburgh, 7th March 1857.*—The Lords appoint this Petition to be intimated on the Walls and in the Minute-Book for fourteen days, and advertized in the Edinburgh Gazette, and North British Advertiser Newspaper, in terms of
