The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council,

Whereas by an act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, ... An act to encourage the "trade into the Levant seas, by providing a more " convenient mode of performing quarantine, and for " reducing the duty granted by an act of the last Sef-" fion on goods, the manufacture of Great Britain, " exported to any place within the Streights of Gib-"raltar," it is declared to be expedient to permit goods and merchandize to be imported from the Levant, under certain regulations and restrictions, without having been opened and aired in the lazarets of any of the ports or places mentioned in an act, paffed in the 26th year of his late Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An act for enlarging " and regulating the trade into the Levant seas." And it is enacted, that it shall be lawful to and for his Majesty, his heirs and successors, by and with the advice of his or their Privy Council, by any order or orders to be iffued from time to time, to grant lifence and permission for the importation into Great Britain, or the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, of all goods, wares, and merchandizes, coming from the Levant feas, without clean bills of health, without fuch goods and merchandizes having been opened and aired in the Lazarets of any of the places mentioned in the faid recited act; and that all fuch goods and merchandizes shall and may be admitted to an entry in any of the ports of Great Britain, or the faid illands of Guerniey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, subject, nevertheless, to such regulations, rules, orders,

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and directions, with respect to opening and airing fuch goods and merchandizes previous to the land ing thereof, and to the performance of quarantine by the crews or other persons belonging to or being on board of the ships or vessels in which such goods or merchandiacs shall be imported, as his Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, shall by any order or orders to be issued as aforesaid, make, prescribe, or direct; any law, statute, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas his Majesty has been pleased, by his order in Council, bearing date the 25th of September last, to direct, That all ships and vessels, persons, goods, and merchandise, which were then arrived, or should thereafter arrive, from the Levant, at any port or place of this king-dom, or the illes of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, without clean bills of health, and and without having performed quarantine in any of the ports of the Mediterranean mentioned in the above recited act, passed in the 26th year of his late Majesty King George II.; and all ships and vessels, persons, goods, and merchandizes whatsoever, liable to quarantine, and not being furnished with clean bills of health, from whatever port or place the same should come, should (until further order) perform their quarantine for the term mentioned in the faid order in Standgate Creek, and no where elfer his Majefly, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, is hereby pleased to order, that the following provisional regulations be (until further order) observed with respect to the due performance of quarantine, by all fuch ships and the crews, or other per-fons belonging to or on board the said ships; and with religer to the unpacking, opening, and airin ofg.

That as foon as any fuch flip shall arrive, the mafter and mate shall immediately proceed in their own boat (which boat shall be attended by a guard boat) to certain huts or tents to be erected on the beach, for the purpose of undergoing the necessary examinatine questions, the superintendant or superintendants of quarantine in Standgate Creek shall make the following enquiries, which shall be answered separately by the maiter and mate, viz. 1118 e.c.

ift, Was the cargo taken in the more than one port; and if fo, declare what hard was taken in at

each place?

2d, Were there any letters, parcels, or other articles delivered to, or received from any ship or vessel met with on the passage, and what were such letters, parcels on other articles, respectively?

3d, Does the whole of the crew and paffengers confift of the same individuals that were on board at the time or times of departure from the port or ports of loading respectively; and if any change or alteration has taken place, point out the same, and the circumstances which occasioned it?

4th, Has any of the crew, passengers, or any other person whatsoever, died on board the ship during the voyage, or been fick or ill of any

disorder whatsoever.

That the answers of the master and mates respectively be taken down in writing hand etherbills of health, manifelts of the cargo, and all letters and packets, be then and there delivered to the superintendant or superintendants of quarantine, and deposited in a veilel with vinegar, and from thence taken out with a pair of tongs, and dried in the smoaking case: and all packets containing inclosures fliable ber proviously: ilit on the fides by the mafter, or mate, fo as to admit of their being completely foaked and fumigated, and shall remain in the smoaking case from 22sto 20 hours, at the differetion of the superintendant or superintendants; and if amongst the parcels there are any that contain more than papers, fuch parcels shall be fent to the hulks, or lazarets, and be fubjected to In 25 the same quarantine as the cargo.

That after fuch examinations shall be completed, the master and mate of the ship or vessel shallcreturn on board, and shall become subject to quarautine until further order.

That in case it shall appear from the above examinations, and the report made to the Commissioners of the Customs by the superintendant or superintendants of quarantine and the medical affistants, and from the bills of health, and the manifest of the cargo, that there is no reason to apprehend danger of infection, the pilots who may have been taken on board to conduct the ship from the Downs (or elsewhere) to Standgate Creek, shall be permitted to go on board the ship appointed for an hospital ship, or to go on shore to a hut or tent constructed on the beach, and provided with necessaries for their reception, and shall there perform a quarantine of four days; at the expiration of which the faid pilots, if they continue free from appearance of infection; shall be fumigated and discharged from quarantine: Provided always, that during this pers) formance of quarantine, the faid pilots shall not have communication with any other perions; in default of which such pilots shall be detained under quarantine until further order. , manual mot este and the mit griding and promise in

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That after the pilots shall have been permitted quit the flips, fall the boats belonging to fuch flips shall be housed out, and delivered into the custody of the superintendant or superintendants of quarantine, who shall cause the faid boats to be moored at a diflance from the fling ; tand unless from circumstances of absolute necessity; the faid boats shall not be returned until the obles and crews are admitted to praobationary airing the supit

That not any thing whatever be delivered from on board the ships without an order from the superin-

That nothing, however insusceptible of infection, be conveyed from one ship to another, mor any perfonal intercourse permitted from thip to thip! 117

That the guards who may be placed on board a ship under quarantine, do accompany, when required, the lighters and the boats belonging to such ship, to prevent any communication in the transit of the cargo from the ship to the lazaret.

That they do take care, that no remnants of cotton, or other articles insceptible of infection, remain in the lighters, but do collect and deliver the fame into the lazarets with the last package

That they do take care, after the discharge of the cargoes into the lazarets, that the holds and between the decks of the ships be completely swept, and the fweepings be burned.

That they fearch diligently the lockers, chefts, &c of the officers, passengers, and crews, and every part of the ships, so that nothing remain undelivered to the lazarets susceptible of infection, but what is abfolutely requifite for daily use; and do see that the chests, clothes, and bedding be daily opened and aired.

That they do make daily report to the superintendant or superintendants and the medical affiftants, as to the state of health of every person on board; and whether the regulations of quarantine are properly

complied with.

That in case any impediment occurs in the execution of these duties, notice be immediately given to the master of the ship, in the first instance; and if thereupon fuch impediment be not instantly removed, to the superintendant or superintendants of quaran-

That the passengers on board all such ships do perform their quarantine in like manner, and for the fame period of time as the crews, unless they are defirous of performing it in other veffels to be hired at their own expence, in which case they shall be liable to a quarantine of 14 days, and at the expiration thereof, if they continue free from infection, they shall be fumigated and discharged.

That after the pilots and the passengers (provided the latter perform their quarantine in a separate vessel) have quitted the thips in which they arrived, the hatches of fuch flips shall be opened, and the probationary airing of the cargo shall commence, in man-

first parcel of goods, a second parcel shall be hoisted up and treated in the like manner for the space of two days; after which a third parcel in succession shall be hoisted up and treated in the same manner for the space of one day; but in case of any suspicious circumstances arising, the probationary airing shall be extended and prolonged as the cafe may require.

That when the probationary airing has been completed, provided the crews and passengers on board continue free from any appearance of infection, the fuperintendant, or superintendants of quarrantine shall permit the ship or vessel under quarantine to be hauled alongfide the hulks or lazarets, into which the rest of the enumerated goods of every discription, and the non-enumerated goods which may be packed in packages susceptible of infection, shall be deposited, to be there opened and aired for the time hereinafter expressed; and the ships, together with the non-enumerated goods which may be packed in packages not susceptible of infection shall depart from the hulks or lazarets to a proper distance, and shall there commence arquarantine of 20 days, at the expiration of which (if all the persons on board continue free from appearance of infection) the ships shall be fumigated and discharged.

That no more than one ship, boat, or vessel, of any kind shall be permitted to be alongside the hulks or

lazarets at the fame time.

That the following goods be opened, unpacked, and aired on board the hulks or lazarets (unless his Majesty shall, by his Order in Council, think fit to direct otherwise) for the space of 40 days, viz.

Hemp and flax, paper or books, filk raw, thrown, or wrought; linen, cotton, wool, cotton yarn, or manufactured; wool, raw or anywife wrought; feathers, grogram, or mohair yarn, human hair, goats hair, Carmenia wool, carpets, camblets, burdets, or other manufactures of filk and cotton; kid fkins, and fkins in the wool or hair; fpunges, wine and oil in chefts; thread stockings; straw hats and brushes, matting, and artificial flowers.

That all non-enumerated goods, except fuch as are packed in wool, glass, or metal, shall be opened and aired on board the hulks or lazarets for the space of twenty days, and that all non-enumerated goods, flowed loofe, or packed in wood, glass, or metal, shall be opened and aired on board the ships in which they arrive, and shall continue under quarantine until

the ships are discharged.

That when the goods are received on board the hulks or lazarets, care be taken to place them feparately from goods previously under quarantine; and that the non-enumerated goods be stowed apart from

the enumerated goods of the same cargoes.

That the enumerated goods be stowed in such manner as to admit of complete perflation and change of air, and the bales to have a feam ripped open all down on one fide, and the porters to thrust in their naked hands and arms for twenty days successively; after which the bales to be fewed up and turned over, and the other fide unripped and managed in the same manner for the space of twenty days more, which shall complete the quarantine.

That a fmall veffel, provided with one or, more, affistants, and with proper necessaries for the recep-si tion of fick persons, be starioned in Standgate Creek its that the northernmost corner of Chetney-hill, a fpages of ground one hundred and twenty feet, be immediately inclosed and fenced, fo as to admit of being fecurely guarded to prev nt escape or communication; and that three small cabins of wood, not less

Little is foon as any fucifile than twenty feet distant from each other, about twelve or fifteen feet square, calculated to hold one person each, and furnished with proper necessaries, be crected on shore near the beach, with a door on each of the four fides, fo that the fick person may always be approached on the windward fide by those who administer nourishment and relief to them.

That the superintendants, and no other persons, shall supply persons and ships in quarantine with provisions and other mes effaries; and all communication

to be carried on by day-light.

And the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treatury, the Commissioners for executing the othice of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Mailer General, and the principal Officers of the Ordnance, his Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the time being of the faid respective Illes of Jersey, Guernscy, Aldersey, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

in pursuance of wour orders of the 21st inft. I proceeded to sea, and at five P. M; on the day following observed a suspicious fail bringing to a bark, whon it hauled my wind to fpeak them, and in paffing the latter, was informed the chace was an enemy; I, immediately made all possible fail after her, and had the goodchick to come up with her next morning at nine A: M. Luwestoffe N. I beg leave to acquaint you, that on the evening of the 21st inst. after a chace of five hours, Beachy Head bearing N.N.E. distant three or four leagues, 1 captured Le Pett Diable French cutter privateer, Monsieur Simon Robert Saltitat, commander, out two days from Dieppe, with small arms only, and eight men on board, the remainder having been sent in a light floop, cut out of Seaford Roads on the night of the 20th inft. and fent for France.
