INDIA BOARD, December 23, 1857.

THE following Dispatch has been received at the East India House:—

No. 1.

The Governor-General of India in Council to the Court of Directors of the East India Company.

Fort-William, November 9, 1857. (No. 71.)

In conformity with instructions received from the Secret Committee, that your Honourable Court should be furnished with authentic intelligence respecting Europeans, whether belonging to the East India Company's service or not, who may be killed or wounded by the hands of rebels, a circular has been issued to the authorities noted on the margin,\* requesting them henceforward to cause such a Return to be made, for submission to your Honourable Court.

2. With respect to past transactions, these authorities have been requested to collect from the best available sources as complete a statement as can be procured of those who have fallen; and that, though this statement is to be made as complete as possible, still, whatever information they might have should be sent in without waiting until the report can be made complete.

3. These Returns, when received, will be duly transmitted to your Honourable Court. In the meantime we forward a list, extracted from letters addressed to this Department.

4. The Home and Military Departments have been directed to submit what information they now possess on the subject to this Department, for transmission to your Honourable Court,

List of Europeans Killed by Rebels, prepared at the Foreign Office, Calcutta.

Major M. T. Blake, Commanding 2d Regiment Infantry, Gwalior Contingent; Captain A. W. Hawkins, Commanding 1st Company Artillery, Gwalior Contingent; Lieutenant A. Proctor, Adjutant 4th Regiment Infantry, Gwalior Contingent; Lieutenant W. Stewart, Commanding 2d Company of Artillery, Gwalior Contingent; Major F. Shirreff, Commanding 4th Regiment Infantry, Gwalior Contingent; Surgeon K. W. Kirk, M.D., Superintending Surgeon; Reverend G. W. Coopland, Assistant Chaplain; Gwalior, 14th May, 9 P.M., on their return from dinner at Brigadier Ramsay's, by the mutinous corps of the Gwalior Contingent, stationed at Gwalior.

Captain Spottiswoode, Cornet Newberry, 1st Regiment Bombay Lancers: Nusseerabad, 29th May, 4 P.M. Killed whilst charging the mutineers, viz., two Regiments Native Infantry and Artillery, who carried on six guns, and made towards Delhi.

Colonel Penney, Commanding 1st Regiment Bombay Lancers: Nusseerabad, 29th May, 4 P.M. Fell dead from his horse on the march.

Captain Hardy, Lieutenant Loch, 1st Regiment Bombay Lancers: Nusseerabad. Wounded on the above occasion.

Mr Hilliard, Mr Fell: Sirsa. Murdered by a Jemadar during the insurrection at, and destruction of, Sirsa.

Mr Davis, (his brother died in the jungle from thirst,) Clerk in Captain Robertson's Office: Sirsa. Murdered on the above occasion.

Mr and Mrs Wedderburn, Magistrate of Hissar; Lt. and Mrs Barwell, Hurriannah Battalion; Mr Daniel, Patrol; Mr Thompson: Hissar. Mr Wedderburn is reported to have been shot in his kutcherry; the rest were massacred in their houses by the Hurriannah Light Infantry.

Lieutenant Townsend. Killed by Dacoits on his way to Mahoba.

Serjeant Fitzgerald: Hansi. Mr Cockerell, Joint Magistrate: Baroda. Cut down by Nawab's Sowars. Mr Bruce, Mr Brinsum, service. Reported by the

Captain Burton and his two sons, Political Agent, Harowtee: Kotah, 15th October. Murdered by the Kotah troops.

Mr Salder, Sub-Assistant-Surgeon: Kotah, 15th October.

Captain Monck Mason, Political Agent, Joudhpore: Ahwa, 18th September. Murdered by the men of the Joudhpore mutineers, aided by the men of the disaffected Thakoors.

Mr Neilson, Veterinary Surgeon; Ferozepore, 19th August. Throat cut from ear to ear by the mutineers of the 10th Cavalry.

Major Spencer and the Quartermaster-Serjeant, 26th Native Infantry: Mean Meer, 30th July. Attacked by the men of the regiment and murdered, along with the Havildar-Major and Soobadar.

Brigadier Brind, Commanding at Sealkote: Sealkote, 9th July. Killed by mutineers of the 9th Light Cavalry.

Dr James Graham, Superintending Surgeon; Dr J. C. Graham, Medical Storekeeper: Sealkote, 9th July. Shot dead by mutineers of the 9th Light Cavalry, in their carriages, in presence of their female relatives.

Captain Bishop, 46th Native Infantry: Sealkote, 9th July. Murdered by mutineers of the 9th Light Cavalry.

Reverend J. Hunter, with wife and child, Missionary: Sealkote, 9th July. Murdered by a Hindoostanee Peon, who had formerly been a Jemadar of Magistrate's Chuprassees, but reduced for bad conduct.

Lieutenant-Colonel Finnis, 11th N.I.; Mrs Chambers, Captain Macdonald and his wife, Captain Taylor, Lieutenant Henderson, Lieutenant Pattle, 20th N.I.; Lieutenant Macnabb, Veterinary-Surgeon Phillips, Veterinary-Surgeon Dawson, his wife and children, 3d Light Cavalry; Captain Fraser, Sappers and Miners; Mr Tregear, Inspector in the Educational Department:—killed at Meerut by the mutineers, 10th May 1857.

Lieutenant-Colonel Hogge, Artillery; Dr Christie, 3d Light Cavalry;—wounded at Meerut by the mutineers, 10th May 1857.

S. Fraser, Esq., Commissioner and Agent; Captain Douglas, commanding the Palace Guards; Rev. M. Jennings, Chaplain; Miss Jennings; Miss Clifford; other European and Christian residents, names not given;—killed by the rebels at Delhi, 11th May 1857.

Captain Corfield, 9th N.I.; wounded at Etawah, by a party of rebel Native Cavalry in the attempt to seize them, 16th May 1857.

Brigadier Sibbald, C.B., Brigadier Bareilly Division; Ensign Tucker, 68th N.I.; Dr Hay, Doctor Bareilly Division; Mr Robertson, C.S., Judge; Mr Orr, Deputy Collector; Mr Raikes, C.S., Additional Sessions Judge; Dr Buch, Educational Inspector; Mr Aspinall's whole family (Mr Aspinall was an Uncovenanted Assistant);—killed in the mutiny at Bareilly, 31st May 1857.

Mr Wyatt; Mr Lawrence, Retired Clerk of the Commissioner's Office, and his family of children, supposed to have been killed in the mutiny at Bareilly, 31st May 1857.

Serjeant Staples, Bareilly Brigade; murdered while flying from Bareilly.

Mr Mordaunt Ricketts, C.S., Rev. Mr McCallum, Presbyterian Minister, and Mr Smith, Officials and inhabitants of Shahjehanpore;—killed by the mutineers in the outbreak at Shahjehanpore, 31st May 1857.

Lieutenant Hutchinson, Quartermaster of the 17th N.I.; shot at Azimgurh by Madho Sing, a Sepoy of the Light Company of the 17th N.I., 3d June 1857. This man owed Lieutenant Hutchinson a grudge.

Serjeant Lewis, Quartermaster-Serjeant of the 17th Native Infantry: Azimgurh; dangerously wounded by the mutineers of the 17th N.I., 3d June 1857.

Lieutenant Mara, commanding the two companies of the Loodiana Regiment of Sikhs; shot in the chest while walking in the verandah of the Cutcherry, at Jounpore, in which place the European inhabitants had taken refuge against a party of Sepoy Mutineers, 5th June 1857.

Mr B. R. Cuppage, C.S., Assistant Magistrate; shot in the back, at Jounpore. He was discovered lifeless on his face by the party who quitted the Cutcherry, 5th June 1857.

Serjeant Bigwood, 13th Irregular Cavalry. Serjeant Bigwood was with the fugitive party from Jounpore, but was killed while going to get some papers from his house, 5th June 1857.

Mr Thriepland, Deputy Collector of Jounpore, and his wife. Mr and Mrs Thriepland and two children were hid in one of the Court Chuprassees' houses, but were betrayed, and shot by some Sowars, 6th June 1857. The children escaped.

Lieutenant Alexander, 6th N.I.; shot through the heart and sabred, at Allahabad, while striving to make his men do their duty, 6th June 1857.

Captain Birch, Fort Adjutant; murdered at Allahabad, during the night 6th June 1857.

Mr Cheek, an Unposted Cadet; died at Allahabad, of wounds inflicted by the mutineers of the 6th N.I. He was, with other prisoners in their hands, rescued by the British troops, on the 16th June, but died that night in the fort.

Mr R. Tucker, C.S. Judge. The native Deputy Collector of Futtehpoore, Heknintoolah Khan, headed the rebellion there, and caused Mr Tucker to be shot, June 1857.

Mr Keymer, employed on the railway, and his wife and children. Duryao Sing, a Zemindar of the Futtehpoore District, collected a number of men in open rebellion, and killed Mr Keymer, his wife and children, June 1857.

Mr Snow, Railway Engineer; supposed to have been killed at the same time with the Keymers.

Mr Cockerell, C.S., Deputy Collector and Joint Magistrate of Banda; Mr Benjamine; Mr Bruce; Mr Lloyd. The Nawab Ali Bahadoor, of Banda, is stated to have caused these gentlemen to be murdered.

Captain Skene, Superintendent; Captain Gordon, Deputy Superintendent; and other European residents, names not given;—killed in the fort of Jhansi, in which they had taken refuge.

Captain Fletcher Hayes, Military Secretary to the Chief Commissioner of Lucknow; Lieutenant Barbor, 2d Regiment of Oude Cavalry; Mr Fayrer, a gentleman volunteer. These officers, with 2 rissalahs of Oude Irregular Cavalry, had been sent by Sir H. Lawrence from Lucknow, under Captain Hayes, his Military Secretary, to aid in keeping order along the Grand Trunk Road and in the Central Doosab Districts; the rissalahs mutinied on the way, and killed the officers.

Serjeant-Major Matthews, 6th Oude Irregular Infantry; shot from the banks of the river while flying with other fugitives from Fyzabad, 18 miles below Adjoudheea (Fyzabad District), 9th June 1857.

Lieutenant Parsons, 6th Oude Irregular Infantry; Lieutenant Currie, Artillery;—drowned while fugitives from Fyzabad, 9th June 1857.

Lieutenant Lindesay, 22d Regiment N.I.; Lieutenant Cantley, 22d Regiment N.I.;—killed at the village of Mowadubur, in the Goruckpoore District, while flying from Fyzabad, 10th June 1857.

Major Blake, Commanding 2d Regiment of Infantry, Gwalior Contingent; Dr Kirke, Superintending Surgeon; Lieutenant A. Procter;—killed by the mutineers of the Gwalior Contingent, 14th June 1857.

Lieutenant Smith, Adjutant of the 4th Irregular Cavalry; shot by a duffadar of his corps, at Mozuffurnuggur, 21st June 1857.

Mr Butterfield; shot in the outbreak at Mozuffurnuggur, 21st June 1857.

Dr Lyell, 1st Assistant Opium Agent; shot in an outbreak in the city of Patna, on the night of the 3d July 1857.

Mr W. A. Moore, C.S., Joint Magistrate and Deputy Collector of Mirzapore, and Superintendent of the Benares Rajah's Dominions; killed by the followers of Jorye Sing and others, zemindars of Poroopoor, at Polee Indigo Factory, near Gopeegunge, 4th July 1857.

Mr Jones, Indigo Planter; Mr Kemp, Indigo Planter;—killed by the followers of Jorye Sing and others, zemindars of Poroopoor, at Polee

Indigo Factory, near Gopeegunge, 4th July 1857.

Major Holmes, 12th Irregular Cavalry, and his wife; the Surgeon, 12th Irregular Cavalry, and his wife;—murdered by the mutineer Sowars of the 12th Irregular Cavalry, at Segowlee, 23d July 1857.

Mr Loyd, C.S., Magistrate and Collector of Humeerpore; Mr Donald Grant, C.S., Joint Magistrate and Deputy Collector of Humeerpore; Mr Murray;—supposed to have been killed. A country born English writer, disguised as a native, came to Allahabad, via Humeerpore, and asserted that these gentlemen were murdered at Oraie.

Captain P. H. C. Burlton, 67th N.I. The company of the 67th N.I., doing duty at Muttra, were to have been relieved by a company of the 44th N.I. from Agra. The opportunity was seized for sending treasure down to Agra, when the men of the 67th, who had behaved well hitherto, shot Captain Burlton, fired at all the Europeans who were at the Cutcherry, and being joined by the relieving company of the 44th N.I., marched to Delhi.

Major Spencer, Commanding 26th Regiment Light Infantry; this regiment had been disarmed. Major Spencer was killed by blows dealt him with a hatchet, at Meean Meer, 30th July 1857.

Major Birch, 41st N.I.; Lieutenant Smalley, 41st N.I.;—killed in the outbreak at Seetapore, in Oude.

Mr Gibson, a Salt Officer; killed by some inhabitants of the Mahomedan village of Kurreegunge (Budaon District), 1st September 1857.

Mr Ronald, Assistant Commissioner, Deogurh; Lieutenant Cooper, 32d N.I.;—killed by the mutineers of the 32d N.I., at Deogurh, 9th October 1857.

List of Europeans Killed or Wounded by the hands of Rebels in the Lower Provinces.

At Rohnee, in the Sonthal Pergunnahs.  
12th June.

Sir Norman Leslie, Adjutant, 5th Irregular Cavalry, killed; Major J. M'Donald, and Assistant-Surgeon N. J. Grant, attached to Irregular Cavalry, wounded;—while sitting together in front of the mess bungalow, a sudden rush was made at them by three men of the regiment, with naked swords: Sir Norman Leslie was disabled by the first blow; Major M'Donald, had two cuts on his head, and Dr Grant received a severe wound in the arm and another in the leg; they both defended themselves with chairs, and succeeded in driving off their assailants. Sir Norman was fearfully wounded, and died shortly after.

At Patna. 3d July.

Assistant-Surgeon R. Lyell, Principal Assistant to the Opium Agent, Patna, killed;—in the disturbance at Patna, on the night of the 3d July, Dr Lyell, while riding in front of his men, to attack the rebels, was shot to the ground.

At Segowlee. 23d July.

Major J. G. Holmes, Commanding 12th Irregular Cavalry, and Mrs Holmes, killed;—while taking

their evening drive; both were killed by the mutineers of the 12th Irregular Cavalry. Assistant-Surgeon H. S. Garner, 12th Irregular Cavalry, and Mrs Garner and child, killed:— the mutineers, after killing Major Holmes, proceeded to the Doctor's Bungalow, forced it open, murdered the Doctor, his wife, and one child, and then set fire to it. One child, a little girl, escaped notice, and was taken care of by the Tehsildar.

24th July.

Mr E. Bennett, Deputy Postmaster killed:— murdered by the mutineers of the same regiment.

At Deoghur. 9th October.

Lieutenant H. C. A. Cooper, Commanding Detachment 32d N.I., and Mr R. E. Ronald, Assistant-Commr., Deoghur, killed by the mutineers of the 32d Native Infantry.

Mr J. W. Garstin, Deputy Magistrate, Buxar, wounded while accompanying the force to relieve Arrah.

**BANKRUPTCIES ANNULLED AND DISMISSED.**

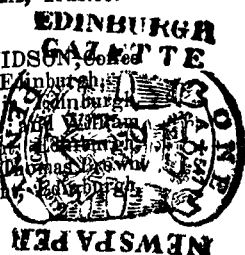
