

I am directed by the Officiating Agent, Governor-General for Central India, to acknowledge the receipt of your circular letter, No. 4372, dated the 3d ultimo, and to forward, for submission to the Right Honourable the Governor-General in Council, a return of Europeans and their families who fell victims to the mutineers during the outbreak at Gwalior, Indore, and Mhow, prepared according to the prescribed form.

2. A more complete statement of Europeans Killed and Wounded by the hands of Rebels will be furnished in the course of a short time, or as soon as particulars are received on the subject from other Military Stations subordinate to this Agency.

WHEREAS George Sholto, Earl of Morton, was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and com-manding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Thursday the third day of June next ensuing, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said George Sholto, Earl of Morton, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law): and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers, the electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain : and We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham-Palace, this seventh day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fiftyeight, and in the twenty-first year of Our reign.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, forwarding copies of Orders recently issued by the Board of Health at that capital, and containing regulations to the following effect in respect to the quarantine to be observed by vessels entering the port of Lisbon.

In addition to the necessary drugs and means of purification and fumigation, quick-lime must be provided for coating such parts of the vessel as are not painted in oil, or covered with a material which can be washed.

The Health Officer at Belem will point out to the masters of vessels undergoing quarantine, the quantity and quality of drugs required for the necessary purposes of purification.

The Health Officer, for the convenience of masters of vessels subjected to a quarantine of observation, can order the discharge of the cargoes into the lazaretto, or into lighters.

The quarantine can be prolonged until the Health Officer shall consider the fumigation of the vessel complete.

The white-liming and other purification required, will extend to vessels anchored off the Custom House, but will not, however, be allowed to affect the discharge of cargoes.

The quarantine for baggage will date from the time of its purification in the lazaretto, and the cost of the drugs, &c., necessary for fumigation, being borne by the owner of the baggage.
