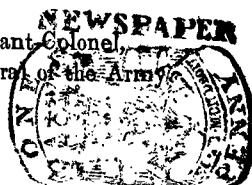

The murderer then rushed down the lines of the 3d Infantry, towards the Quarter Guard, where the two guns were, calling on the men of that Regiment, of whom there were about 164 in the lines,— the remainder being on Field Service,—to rise and murder the Christians. He was joined by only two Sepoys. With these he took refuge behind the guns, which had in the meantime been manned and pointed on the lines by the Artillery detachment, con- sisting of a Havildar and 14 men. This detachment had arrived from Nagpore only four or five days before, and was in open mutiny. Two of the men had watched the gates of the Serjeant-Major's house with drawn swords while the Lascar was engaged in murdering him. When the murderer and mutineers found that the men of the 3d Infantry would not join them, the former fled under cover of the night, and the latter, consisting of the Artillery detachment, 15 in number, and two Sepoys of the 3d In- fantry, in all 17 men, gave themselves up. They were immediately brought to trial, and having been fully convicted on the after- noon of the 21st instant, were all hanged together on the following morning. The murderer has not yet been captured, but every effort will continue to be made for his apprehension, and he cannot, it is believed, remain undiscovered long.

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Wednesday, the 2d of June next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

ADMIRALTY, May 18, 1858.

A DESPATCH, of which the following is a copy, has been received by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty from Captain Sotheby, of Her Majesty's steam-ship Pearl, reporting the proceedings of the Naval Brigade, under his command in India, from the 13th February to the 9th March 1858:—

Camp, Amorah,  
March 16, 1858.

SIR,  
I HAVE the honour to report for your information, the proceedings of the Naval Brigade under my charge since the 13th February.

On the 13th I received instructions from Brigadier-General MacGregor, Military Commissioner at Jung Bahadoor's Army, to form a force consisting of 140 of the Naval Brigade, with 100 Goorkhas, to proceed to Raibundpore, and escort a fleet of 150 boats, which were required to construct a bridge for the Nepaulese Army to cross over into Oude.

On the 14th we left, attended by the Jumna steamer, but, from the fresh wind, only made five

miles, the boats constantly fouling, and at times in crossing over, the utmost confusion prevailed.

On the 15th it blew a perfect gale, with clouds of sand, which made it excessively hot and disagreeable.

On the 16th, at about 2 P. M., we collected the boats two miles below the village and Fort of Chandepore, which completely commanded the river, and having received information that the village and fort were prepared to resist, I landed on the 17th at 10 A.M., with the force named in the margin,\* to attack and drive out the rebels, who were reported to be in some force. Having formed line with the seamen, with 1 small howitzer in the centre, under Lieutenant N. E. B. Turnour, preceded by a strong body of skirmishers formed by the marines and seamen, with supports by other seamen and Seikhs, under Captain Weston, Lieutenant Burlton, and Mr Alex. W. Ingles, Mate, and leaving the Goorkhas as a reserve, I quickly pushed forward through the thick cover, topes, and high growing crops, and passed through the village, which was deserted; but on emerging from it the skirmishers were instantly received by a heavy fire of musketry and shot from 2 guns, from men concealed in the rifle pits and breastworks in the thick prickly jungle of bamboo. Captain Weston most gallantly dashed forward with the marines, and whilst trying to force in the outer gate of the entrance, was severely wounded by a scoundrel who had just implored mercy. The column quickly moving up, a sharp fire was maintained on both sides, our men getting shelter in the village within 50 yards of the jungle. The gun, with some difficulty, owing to the narrowness of the lane, was placed within 100 yards, and plied well with grape. At the same time I ordered Mr John Fowler, Second Master, in the Jumna, to steam a-head and enfilade the fort with grape, and the Goorkhas to threaten the right flank. The enemy, fearing their retreat might be cut off, fled out in the rear, when we advanced in front and captured 2 guns and limbers, spare waggon, with ammunition, &c., a quantity of rich dresses, arms, grain, and money. The action commenced at 11, and ceased at 12.15. It is probable that the loss of the enemy, which is reported to be about 300, was but small, as they were entirely concealed, fighting behind breastworks and pits. Our casualties were but 4 wounded, owing to their high fire.

The object being accomplished, I did not attempt to pursue the enemy through the thick

country and large neighbouring village, all against us. I therefore passed the fleet immediately up, and having burnt and destroyed the fort with all the adjacent buildings, I withdrew the pickets, re-embarked and proceeded up the river; but it being quite dark, with no pilot or chart, we grounded and remained within 200 yards of the bank till the following morning.

It affords me much pleasure in reporting to you the cheerful behaviour of all my party, especially Captain Weston of the 36th Native Infantry, Lieutenant Turnour, and Mr Ingles, mate, and my aide-de-camp Mr Stephenson, who gallantly volunteered to lead an escalating party on the river side, an attempt too hazardous for me to accede to.

The following officers were also on the field, Lord Charles Scott, Mr Foot, Mr Richd. Cooley, boatswain, and Dr W. J. Shone, Assistant-Surgeon, who all did good service. I also received much assistance from Captain Reid, 37th Native Infantry, who served as a volunteer.

It is nearly impossible to describe the strength of this extraordinary fort, peculiar to Oude. It was surrounded, except on the river side, by a thick jungle of prickly bamboo, nearly impassable, with a small entrance and gateway. Inside were rows of rifle-pits and loop-holed breastworks, a zig-zag path, with cross ditches and gates, leading to a second row, and terminating with small bastions and curtain in front of the fort, which was a large irregular brick building with corner turrets and outer walls, all loop-holed. A few other buildings made defensible, were connected by thick cover and paths.

From the valuable dresses found, I have no doubt the enemy felt themselves perfectly secure.

On the 18th I arrived at Chupra Ghaut, and disembarked with my party, as it was arranged to cross over with a brigade of 1,500 Goorkhas, Naval Brigade, and 10 guns; but from the heavy sand, high wind, and the enemy in force on the opposite side, the arrangements were altered.

On the 19th, I received directions to re-embark my party with 200 Goorkhas and an additional howitzer, and escort the boats higher up.

When I arrived at the fort and large town of Ichoura, I found it evacuated, 3 guns having been sent to the opposite side to assist in clearing out the rebels. The river then took 2 channels, with broad sands of 2 miles between. The boats proceeded up by the left bank; owing to the shallowness of the water I went up by the right, but having no pilot or chart, and this being the first steamer ever up the river, we grounded several times. The channel ran up under a steep bank, and close to a thick jungle of bamboo for about 2 miles, on which the guns were kept trained and the men with their rifles all ready to act. I afterwards rejoined the boats, and at 7 P.M. arrived opposite Narinee, and found there encamped the rest of the force, after a march of 20 miles.

At 10 P.M. I crossed over to the opposite bank, with the force as per margin,\* to occupy the village and fort of Narinee; the men wading up to their waists, had much difficulty in landing the guns. Not having any spy, or knowing the precise position, and it being very dark, it was midnight when the marines and a party of seamen, under Lieutenant F. G. Pym and Mr Ingles, got round to the right, through thick jungle, and passing the outer breastworks and other defences, found the fort evacuated, whilst the other party with the

guns, under Lieutenant Turnour, had crept round to the left; we then bivouacked for the night, and conveyed over our baggage and ammunition the following forenoon, under the direction of that enterprising officer Lieutenant H. D. Grant. Being joined by 1,000 Goorkhas and 6 guns, the force named in the margin,\* all under Colonel Rowcroft, left their encampment at 2 P.M. the same day, to attack the enemy, who had advanced in the morning to retake their abandoned positions. Having passed over a tract of very heavy country, through several thick tops of trees and deserted villages at 5 P.M., we discovered the enemy's position, by their opening a fire from their guns as we came over the hill; ours were immediately got into position, and returned shrapnell with great precision; the marines and Seikhs, and a few Goorkhas, who were skirmishers, rapidly advanced on their left, when a heavy fire of musketry was kept up, but driving in the enemy's skirmishers they rushed to the guns and captured 2, the first by Lieutenant Pym and Acting-Sergeant Butler, and a few marines, who immediately turned it on the enemy and fired 7 rounds, and put them to flight. The enemy's cavalry, with some infantry and a gun, made several attempts to push forward, but as we steadily advanced, were driven back and finally fled, quickly followed by the remainder of the Naval Brigade and 200 Goorkhas for about 2 miles. It now being quite dark, and our party being entirely by themselves, we gave them a parting round, and retired to our first position, where we re-joined our allies quietly smoking their pipes, and after a few minutes rest, marched back to the camp, where we arrived at 10 P.M. to dinner; the men having been at work the whole of that day under a hot sun, and having had no rest the previous night, were completely exhausted.

The enemy's force was computed about 2,500, with some hundreds of cavalry and 6 guns, 3 of which were captured.

Gholab Sing, their leader, is reported to be wounded; about 100 are supposed to have been killed; many wounded were removed from the field.

The want of cavalry, as usual, was much felt. The enemy's position was opposite the Nepaulese army, who had been several times frustrated in attempting to cross; but now, all obstacles being removed, the boats immediately passed up.

It afforded me much pleasure to observe the steadiness and coolness of the seamen under Lieutenant S. W. D. Radcliffe, Mr Ingles, mate, and Lord Charles Scott; and the gallant manner that Lieutenant Pym, with the marines, captured the guns, whilst our battery was quickly brought into position by Lieutenant Turnour, and Mr Foot, midshipman, and fired with much precision.

The following officers were also on the field and rendered good service:—Messrs\* Cooley and John Burton, Warrant Officers; the Rev. Mr Williams, with Mr T. H. L. Bowling, Acting Clerk, were ready to assist Assistant-Surgeons W. J. Shone and Dickinson; the Honourable Mr Montagu acted as aide-de-camp to Colonel Rowcroft; and Mr Stephenson was as usual very active in carrying orders. I am happy to say our wounded were but 2, as the enemy lost their range as we advanced; the Goorkhas had 2 killed, and 3 wounded.

On the 22d we marched to the village of Phoolpore, and assisted, with fatigue parties, to construct the bridge, which was finished the following evening, when we recrossed the Gogra, and the Nepaulese army, of 10,000 infantry, with

22 guns, under His Highness Jung Bahadour, passed over into Oude, and immediately advanced on Lucknow; and the Naval Brigade, with 1000 Goorkhas, proceeded up the Gogra, to watch the enemy's movements opposite Fyzabad, where they are supposed to be in large force.

I very much regret I was deprived of the services, on the 20th, of Lieutenant H. D. Grant, whose zeal and enterprise at all times has been beyond all praise.

On the 26th I proceeded with the Naval Brigade to Bustee, about fifteen miles, and marched to Kaptangunge the following day, the same distance, and moved further on to Amorrhah, on the 2d instant. Soon after encamping, we heard that a party of the Yeomanry Cavalry, who had been sent on in advance, had been fired on whilst reconnoitering the fort at Belwar, and required assistance. The men being much fatigued from a march over heavy and wet roads, rested a few hours, and at 2 p.m. the force, as per margin,\* under Colonel Rowcroft, left the camp, and was afterwards joined by the Yeomanry Cavalry. It was nearly 5 o'clock when we got into position in front of the fort, and then only discovered the nature of the works and strength of the garrison, which had been represented as only 200. Our guns opened out at about 900 yards on the south face and south-east angle, and gradually reduced to 350, under Lieutenant Turnour and Mr Maquay, whilst the skirmishers, formed by the marines and seamen, under Lieutenant Grant, Lieutenant Pym, and Mr Ingles, acting mate, crept up within 200 yards under cover, and made good practice with their rifles. The enemy immediately returned the fire from four guns, muskets, and rifles, from the old face of the parapet, and though the shells were thrown with good effect, setting the embrasures and other parts on fire, assisted by a 24-pounder rocket, under Mr Richard Parkins, gunner, yet the enemy at dark gave no signs of yielding, but threw out parties to enfilade us with a gun and musketry. Finding it impracticable, from the darkness and want of knowledge of the place, to effect an assault, and being quite unprepared for such a resistance, Colonel Rowcroft, at 6 h 30 m., withdrew the force about three miles, where we remained for the night, and information was received the following morning that reinforcements from Fyzabad, with guns, had been sent across during the night. We therefore returned to camp, not deeming a second attack prudent against such odds. The garrison is reported to have been about 1200, 500 of whom were sepoys; about 70 were killed and wounded. I am glad to report our casualties were but few, the enemy's fire, though at 200 yards, was much too high, and our men got good shelter in two villages, and under banks and sandhills.

The following officers were also on the field—Mr John Fowler, second master; Mr Foot, midshipman; and Mr Cooley, boatswain. The Reverend Mr Williams was ready to assist Dr Shone. Mr Stephenson, my aide-de-camp, and the Honourable V. A. Montagu, aide-de-camp to Colonel Rowcroft, were as usual very active; and everybody behaved with the most perfect coolness under very trying circumstances and heavy firing, especially the skirmishers under Lieutenant Grant, at all times a most energetic officer.

On the 5th, the garrison of Fyzabad having crossed over and been joined by the rebels from Nawabgunge, under Mahomet Hussein, the Rajahs of Gouda and Ghurda, &c., advanced within one

mile from our encampment, the men, though employed nearly all the night in throwing up entrenchments, and under arms from two in the morning expecting an attack, anticipated the enemy by an hour in marching out, as per margin,\* to meet them in the field. They had taken up a strong position, with a large village in their front, and occupied the topes and rising ground on both sides, with a long line of skirmishers concealed in the high crops, endeavouring to outflank us. The action commenced at 8 h. 30 m., when the enemy's bugles sounded the advance, by our skirmishers (formed by the marines, seamen, and Seikhs, under Lieutenants Pym and Burton, with Mr Ingles, mate,) coming in collision with theirs, and we soon drove them in, from our rapid and telling fire. The guns, under Lieutenant Tournour, Mr Maquay, and Mr Foot, at the same time taking ground to the right, opened out at about 900 yards with great precision. The naval column, under Lieutenants Radcliffe and Grant, Lord Charles Scott, and Mr Fowler, second master, then rushed forward with a volley and a cheer, drove the enemy out of the village, captured two guns, and immediately turned them. The whole line quickly advanced at the double, as the enemy's line, extending for upwards of two miles, halted, but the enemy soon afterwards gave way as we pressed forward. At about 9 h. 30 m. the cavalry, with Captain Chapman, sweeping round to the right, under the directions of Colonel Rowcroft, made a most brilliant charge, drove in the enemy's left flank, whilst our guns galloped up, opened out with shrapnel, and shook the centre, the Goorkhas and Seikhs, under the European officers, rendering most admirable service at the same time. Shortly afterwards 6 guns were captured; 2 more by the Naval Brigade, 2 by a small party of cavalry under Cornet Prinsep, in the rear of ours, whom I directed to advance, and 2 by the Goorkhas; the enemy, with 2 others, which they succeeded in carrying off the field, constantly attempted to stand, but were finally driven in on all sides except in the topes, from which they kept up a constant fire till cleared out; the chiefs, seated on elephants, were dispersed in the most utter confusion, some killed and others wounded by two shells bursting over their heads at 800 yards, and pursued within one mile of the fort at Belwar and their own entrenchments, which we had seen enough of a few days previous; the firing ceased at 12 h. 30 m.

The men being much fatigued by their previous arduous duties, and fighting under a bright sun during four hours, halted for a few minutes, and then returned to camp, which had been in the meantime threatened by about 1,500 of the enemy, who were driven back by a squadron of cavalry with two companies of Goorkhas, under those two excellent and cool officers Major Richardson and Captain Brooks, Native Infantry.

The force is computed to have been at least 14,000, including 3,500 sepoys of the 1st, 10th, 53d, and 56th Regiments, 700 Gwalior contingent, 2d battalion of Oude police force (Weston's), and 300 sowars, with 10 guns, 8 of which were captured; about 1,000 men are reported killed and wounded, 700 of whom were sepoys, with a rajah and about 15 sirdars. The enemy's fire was very accurate, but owing to our rapid advance, they soon lost their range; it is quite a miracle, considering the force and numbers of topes of trees and villages the skirmishers held, that I have to report so few casualties; although I have to

deplore the loss of Mr John Fowler, second master, a very promising young officer, whose clothes had just been riddled with grape in assisting to capture a gun, and who so cleverly directed those on board the Jumna a few days previous, at the capture of the fort at Chandepore, and ten men wounded.

The success of this very important victory, gained against such odds, has saved this part of India from a second and immediate rebellion, as Koor Sing, with 5,000 at Tandah, was ready to cross over and be joined with 7,000 others, and all the principal zemindars, now fugitives, were returning to raise their followers; and I must beg most respectfully to bring before your notice the prominent part this brigade took, and the services it has rendered the Government; the coolness and courage displayed by every officer and man in their unusual, but now not novel duty, (this being the fifth time they have been in action in India,) was most praiseworthy, and fully deserves your favourable attention.

The gunnery, under the respective officers, with the captains of the guns, elicited the admiration of all; the skirmishers, with the marines, were most steady in their work, and it is incumbent on me especially to point out the gallant manner in which Lieutenant Grant, R.N., assisted by Lord Charles Scott, Mr Shearman, engineer, and Jesse Ward, captain of foretop, captured a gun, shooting down the crew, and turning it on the enemy; and also the gallant conduct of John Goodfellow, captain of forecastle, who, after firing a shell at another gun, galloped up with his own gun and took it. Lieutenant Pym, who is always well forward with his men, speaks very highly of Serjeant-Major Argent and Acting-Serjeant Butler, two very steady men.

The following officers were also on the field, and to their services I am much indebted. Mr Cooley, boatswain, was very active with the skirmishers. Mr Parkins, gunner, kept the limbers well supplied, having fired 140 shell and shot. The Reverend Mr Williams, with Mr Bowling, acting clerk, were most ready in assisting Drs Shone and Dickinson, assistant-surgeons, with the wounded; and Mr Burton, carpenter, a most active officer, who I was obliged to leave with the sick to defend the camp.

Mr Stephenson, midshipman, my aide-de-camp, a most spirited young officer, the fifth time under fire, was always at hand, and only too eager in conveying messages at a great risk; the Honourable V. A. Montagu was very attentive in his duties to Colonel Rowcroft, who speaks highly of his conduct.
