At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 29th day of July 1859,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was graciously pleased, by Her Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirtieth day of April last, to promise and declare that the Bounties of Ten Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Five Peauds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for Her Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the age of forty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should, on or before the fifteenth day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Her Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, ex at Rendezveus on Shore for raising men for the nervice of the Royal Navy: and whereas Her Majesty was also graciously pleased by Her said Proclamation to declare that all Able-bodied Landsmen, not above the age of twenty-five, nor under the age of twenty years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the sum of Forty Shillings each man as Her Majesty's Royal Bounty:

And whereas the time limited for Payment of the said Bounties, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, was, by Order in Council of the eleventh day of June last, prolonged and extended from the said fifteenth day of June to the thirty-first day of this instant July; and it being judged expedient for Her Majesty's Service that Bounties should, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, be continued to be paid for some time longer, but that the same should be reduced to Eight Pounds in respect of Able Seamen, and to Four Pounds in respect of Ordinary Seamen, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the time limited for payment of the said reduced Bousties of Eight Pounds to Able Seamen, and of Four Pounds to Ordinary Seamen, be prolouged and extended from the said thirty-first day of this instant July, to the thirtieth day of September text, inclusive; Whereof all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
