Ordinance by the Scottish Universities Commissioners with reference to Graduation in Medicine in the University of Edinburgh.

At Edinburgh, the Sixth Day of August, Eighteen Hundred and Fifty-nine Years.

WHEREAS, on the Twelfth Day of March in the present Year, the Commissioners appointed and acting under the Authority of an Act passed in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Years of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter Eighty-three, intituled, 'An Act to make Provision for the better Government and Discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and Improving and Regulating the Course of Study therein; and for the Union of the Two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen,' made an Ordinance, under which, as approved of by Her Majesty in Council, the Provisions of the said Act will come into Operation with Reference to the University of Edinburgh on the Fifteenth Day of October next: **AND WHEREAS** by the said Act the Commissioners are empowered, amongst other Things, to make Rules as to the Granting of Degrees, whether in Arts, Divinity, Law, or Medicine, in the several Universities of Scotland:—

The Commissioners Statute and Ordain, with Reference to the Granting of Degrees in Medicine in the University of Edinburgh, that, from and after the Fifteenth Day of October in the present Year, the following shall be the Regulations under which such Degrees shall be conferred:—

I. That the preliminary Branches of Extra-Professional Education shall be English, Latin, Arithmetic, the Elements of Mathematics, and the Elements of Mechanics; and that the Proficiency of Students in these Branches shall, as far as possible, be ascertained by Examination prior to the Commencement of their Medical Study.

II. That no Candidate shall be admitted to a Professional Examination, who has not passed a satisfactory Examination on at least Two of the following Subjects (in Addition to the Subjects mentioned above):—Greek, French, German, Higher Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, Logic, Moral Philosophy; and that the Examination on these latter Subjects also shall, as far as possible,

take place before the Candidate has entered on his Medical Curriculum. The Examinations shall be conducted by Examiners in Arts, together with some of the Medical Examiners.

III. That a Degree in Arts (not being an honorary Degree) in any One of the Universities of England, Scotland, or Ireland, shall exempt from all preliminary Examination.

IV. That no one shall be admitted to a Degree in Medicine, who has not been engaged in Medical and Surgical Study for Four Years—the Medical Session of each Year, or *Annus Medicus*, being constituted by at least Two Courses of not less than One Hundred Lectures each, or by One such Course, and Two Courses of not less than Fifty Lectures each; with the Exception of the Clinical Courses, in which Lectures shall be given at least Twice a Week during the prescribed Periods.

V. That no one shall be admitted to the Examination for a Degree, who has not given sufficient Evidence by Certificates—

1. That he has studied each of the following Departments of Medical Science, viz.:—

ANATOMY,
CHEMISTRY,
MATERIA MEDICA and PHARMACY,
INSTITUTES of MEDICINE or PHYSIOLOGY,
PRACTICE of MEDICINE,
SURGERY,
MIDWIFERY, and the DISEASES peculiar to WOMEN and CHILDREN; Two Courses of Midwifery, of Three Months each, being reckoned equivalent to a Six Months' Course, provided different Departments of Obstetric Medicine be taught in each of the Courses,
GENERAL PATHOLOGY, or, in Schools where there is no such Course, a Three Months' Course of Lectures on Morbid Anatomy, together with a supplemental Course of Practice of Medicine, or Clinical Medicine,

During Courses including not less than One Hundred Lectures.

2. That he has attended, for at least Two Years, the Medical and Surgical Practice of a General Hospital, either at *Edinburgh* or elsewhere, which accommodates not fewer than Eighty Patients, and possesses a distinct Staff of Physicians and Surgeons.
3. That he has been engaged, for at least Three Months, by Apprenticeship or otherwise, in Compounding and Dispensing Drugs at the Laboratory of an Hospital or Dispensary, of a Member of a Surgical College or Faculty, of a Licentiate of the *London* or *Dublin* Society of Apothecaries, or a Member of the Pharmaceutical Society of *Great Britain*.
4. That he has attended, for at least Six Months, by Apprenticeship or otherwise, the Outpractice of an Hospital, or the Practice of a Dispensary, or of a Physician, Surgeon, or Member of the *London* or *Dublin* Society of Apothecaries.

VI. That no One shall obtain a Degree who has not studied, in the Manner already prescribed, for at least One Year in the University of *Edinburgh*.

VII. That every Candidate must deliver, before the Thirty-first day of March of the Year in which he proposes to Graduate, to the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine—

1. A Declaration, in his own Handwriting, that he has completed his Twenty-first Year; and that he will not be on the Day of Graduation under Articles of Apprenticeship to any Surgeon or other Master;
2. A Statement of his Studies, as well in Literature and Philosophy as in Medicine, accompanied with proper Certificates;
3. A Thesis composed by himself, to be approved by the Medical Faculty.

VIII. That each Candidate shall be Examined, both in Writing and *visd Voce*,—*First*, on Chemistry, Botany, and Natural History; *Secondly*, on Anatomy, Institutes of Medicine, and Surgery; and, *Thirdly*, on Materia Medica, Pathology, Practice of Medicine, Clinical Medicine, Clinical Surgery, Midwifery, and Medical Jurisprudence. The Examinations on Anatomy, Chemistry, Institutes of Medicine, Botany, and Natural History shall be conducted, as far as possible, by Demonstrations of Objects placed before the Candidates; and those on Medicine and Surgery in Part by Clinical Demonstrations in the Hospital.

IX. That Students who profess themselves ready to submit to an Examination on the First Division of these Subjects at the End of their Second Year may be admitted to Examination at that Time.

X. That Students who have passed their Examination on the First Division of these Subjects may be admitted to Examination in the Second Division at the End of their Third Year.

XI. That the Examination on the Third Division shall not take Place until the Candidate has completed his Fourth *Annus Medicus*.

XII. That Candidates may, if they choose, be admitted to Examination on the First Two of these Divisions at the End of their Third Year; or to the Three Examinations at the End of their Fourth Year.

XIII. That if any Candidate, at these Examinations, be found unqualified, he shall not be again admitted to Examination, unless he shall have studied during another Year Two of the prescribed Subjects, either in the University, or in some other School of Medicine.

XIV. That after the Candidate shall have satisfied the Medical Examiners, the Dean shall lay the Proceedings before the Senatus Academicus, by whose Authority the Candidate shall be summoned, on the Thirty-first Day of July, or, if that Day be Sunday, then on the preceding Day, to defend his Thesis; and, finally, if the Senate think fit, he shall be admitted, on the First Day of August, or, if that Day be Sunday, then on the following Day, to his Degree.

XV. That the Senatus Academicus, on the Day here appointed, shall assemble at Ten o'clock A.M. for the Purpose of conferring Degrees; and no Candidate, unless a sufficient Reason be assigned, shall absent himself, on Pain of being refused his Degree for that Year.

XVI. That Candidates for Graduation shall be required to produce Evidence of their having conformed to the Regulations which were in Force at the Time they commenced their Medical Studies.

An Act for making a Railway from the Trent Valley Railway at Nuneaton, in the county of Warwick, to Hinckley, in the county of Leicester; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the construction of a railway from Hungerford, in Berkshire, to Devizes, in Wiltshire, to be called "The Berks and Hants Extension Railway."

An Act for incorporating the British and Canadian Telegraph Company, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Victoria Station and Finsley Railway Company to raise further sums of money.

An Act to authorise the South Staffordshire Railway Company to acquire certain lands and raise additional capital, and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the London and North-Western Railway Company to construct new works and acquire additional lands in the counties of Lancaster and Northampton, and for other purposes.

An Act to authorise the maintenance and use of the Silverdale and Newcastle-under-Lyme Railway, and the use of the Extension Railway to the Newcastle-under-Lyme Canal, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a branch from the North Staffordshire Railway, in the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, in the county of Stafford, and for extending the time for completing certain works, and for authorising arrangements with the London and North-Western Railway Company, and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the Stockton and Darlington Railway Company to make a new railway and other works, and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the Wells and Fakenham Railway to and along Wells Quays, and for other purposes.

An Act for making the Kensington Station and North and South London Junction Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company to construct branch railways from Oldham to Rochdale and Royton, in the county of Lancaster, and for other purposes.

An Act for enabling the Midland Railway Company to make an extension of their Erewash Valley Line, to acquire additional lands in the county of Leicester, and for other purposes.

An Act to suspend, in certain cases, the operation of the twenty-eighth section of "The Liverpool Sanitary Amendment Act, 1854," and for other purposes.

An Act to facilitate arrangements by the Londonderry and Coleraine Railway Company with their creditors, and for other purposes.

An Act for the making and maintaining of the West London Extension Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the "Tacumshin Embankment Act, 1854," and to extend the time for the completion of the works authorised by that Act.

An Act for making and maintaining, in and near to Burton-upon-Trent, of branch railways from the Midland Railway, and the building of a new bridge across the river Trent, at Burton-upon-Trent, and the taking down and removing of the Great Bridge at Burton-upon-Trent, and for other purposes.

An Act to confer certain powers upon "The Pneumatic Despatch Company (Limited)."

An Act for the better regulation of Watermen, Barge Owners, and others connected with the navigation of the river Thames between Teddington Lock and Lower Hope Point.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Turin, stating that the duty on Crochet Tulle has been reduced from six francs to two francs fifty centimes per kilogramme, to commence from the 25th July last.

N.B.—Crochet Tulle admitted at this reduced rate is tulle intended for furniture, and not for dress, the latter remaining at the old duty of six francs.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Chili, enclosing a copy of an Edict, published by the Minister of Finance, on the 14th May last, by which the exemption from export duties, which formerly existed, on copper smelted by Chilian coal, has been repealed, and the duty upon the exportation of that metal, whether smelted by national or foreign coal, will henceforth be levied equally.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, transmitting a copy of a notice, issued by the Board of Health at Lisbon, stating that—

I.—From the 15th July last the port of Altona is considered to be infected with Cholera Morbus, and all the other ports of Denmark and of the Hanse Towns suspected.

II.—From the 15th of June, the port of Maranhão is considered to be suspected of infection with Yellow Fever, and the port of Ceará from the 1st of July last, thereby altering the previous notices relative to the same ports.
