At the Council-Chamber, Whitehall, the 22d day of October 1859.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the 19th & 20th years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "An Act to make * better provision for the removal of Nuisances, regulation of lodging-houses, and the health of Towns in Scotland," it is, amongst other things, canceled, that whenever any part of the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with, or is sected by any formidable epidemic, endemic, or coatagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council, or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), may, by Order or Orders by them from time to time made, direct that the provisions for the prevention of diseases contained in Part II of the said Act be put in force in sectland, or in such parts thereof, or in such places therein, as in such Order or Orders may be expressi ; and may, from time to time, as to all or any of the parts of places to which any such Order or Orders extend, and in like manner revoke or wnew any such Order, and, subject to revocation and renewal as aforesaid, every such Order shall be the ferce for six calendar months, or for such theree period as in such Order shall be expressed; and every such Order of Her Majusty's Privy Council, or any Members thereof, soresaid, shall be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and shall be published in the Edinburgh Gazette; such publication shall be conclusive evidence f such Order.

And whereas the Parish of Wick, in the County of Continess, is affected by a formidable epidemic, dedunic, or contagious disease, and a case has a time for putting in force the provisions of the said

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered by the Burds and others of Heir Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, (of whom the Right Honorable Bir George Compwall Lewis, Bart, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is one,) in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them are aforesaid; that the provisions for the preventions of dispuses contained in Part II of the said bursingleone recited Act, be put in force in the said

Parish of Wick, in the County of Caithness, immediately from and after the date of this Order.

And it is hereby further ordered, that this Order shall continue in force for six calendar months from and after the date hereof.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the 'Burial Ground (Scotland) Act, 1855,' it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, upon a Representation of one of Her Principal Secretaries of State, that a copy of an Interlocutor of a Sheriff of a County in Scotland, under certain provisions of the said Act, has been received by him, in pursuance thereof to order that no new Burial Ground shall be opened within certain limits specified in such Order, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, or, (as the case may be,) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, Burials within certain limits, or in certain Burial Grounds or places of Burial, shall be Discontinued wholly, or subject to any qualifications or exceptions mentioned in such Order; and that such Order in Council shall thereupon have like force and effect as if the same were embodied in the said Act: Provided always, that Notice of such Representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be transmitted to the Crown Agent in Edinburgh, and Sheriff-Clerk of the County in which such Burial Ground is situate, and that the same shall be by them respectively published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and fixed on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parishes affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered.
