DIRECTIONS and REGULATIONS of The BOARD of SUPERVISION for the RELIEF of The POOR in SCOTLAND, issued under the Authority of the Nuisances' Removal (Scotland) Act, 1856, Section 24.

To the Parochial Board of the Parish of Wick, in the County of Caithness, being the Local Authority, in that Parish, in terms of the Nuisances' Removal (Scotland) Act, 1856.

WHEREAS by the said Act 19 & 20 Vict., cap. 103, Part II, for the prevention or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that whenever any part of the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with, or is affected by any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them, (the Lord President of the Council, or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, being one,) may, by Order or Orders by them from time to time made, direct that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part II of the said Act, be put in force in Scotland, or in such parts thereof, or in such places therein, as in such Order or Orders may be expressed, and may, from time to time, as to all or any of the parts or places to which any such Order or Orders extend, and in like manner, revoke or renew any such Order; and, subject to revocation and renewal as aforesaid, every such Order shall be in force for six calendar months, or for such shorter period as in such Order shall be expressed.

And whereas, by the 24th Section of the said Act, it is further provided, that when such an Order in Council has been issued, the Board of Supervision may issue such Directions and Regulations as they shall think fit, for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of such epidemic, endemic, or contagious diseases, and from time to time may revoke, renew, and alter any such Directions and Regulations; and the same shall extend to all parts or places in which the provisions of the said Act for the prevention of disease, shall, for the time being, be put in force, under such Orders as aforesaid, unless such Directions and Regulations be expressly confined to some of such parts or places, and then to such parts or places as therein

are specified; and (subject to the power of revocation and alteration herein contained) such Directions and Regulations shall continue in force so long as the said provisions of the Act shall, under such Order, be applicable to the same parts or places.

And whereas, by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 22d day of October 1859, the said provisions of the said Act were directed to be put in force in the Parish of Wick for a period of six calendar months then next ensuing;

Therefore, in exercise of the authority vested in us as aforesaid, We, the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor in Scotland, do issue the Directions and Regulations hereinafter contained, to extend to all parts of the Parish of Wick, and to all Vessels in the Harbours or Creeks of the said Parish.

The Local Authority shall forthwith take measures for the removal of all Nuisances, in the manner provided in the Nuisances' Removal Act above cited, and shall carry out such measures effectually, and as speedily as may be.

Measures shall be taken to enforce or effect the lime-washing of the interior of all rooms, stairs, passages, or houses, from which any Nuisance has been removed, or which may be deemed to require that precaution.

A house-to-house visitation, for the purpose of discovering cases of bowel complaint, and of providing the appropriate remedies, shall at once be organized and carried out throughout the Parish; and the Medical Officers conducting that visitation shall be required to impress, as far as possible, upon all classes, the importance of early application for advice and medicine on the first appearance of any tendency to bowel complaints, as well as the great danger of intemperance, especially during the prevalence of cholera, which is frequently induced by it.

Arrangements shall be made to have the appropriate remedies available at all times, by night and by day, at numerous places, so selected and distributed that they may be within easy reach of every person; and means shall be taken to make known to every one the places at which such remedies can be obtained.

Suitable houses or rooms shall immediately be secured, and prepared for the reception of persons attacked by the prevailing disease, as the Medical Practitioner, in charge of the



shall deem it advisable to remove thither for treatment; and for all persons so removed, proper sick-bed attendance shall be provided.

Immediate arrangements shall be made to secure the services of efficient Nurses, who can be employed at the shortest notice, to attend Patients who may stand in need of such attendance, and whose chances of recovery may be seriously affected by delay in providing a competent Nurse.

The aid of a sufficient number of duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and of other Officers and Persons, shall be secured to carry into effect these Directions and Regulations.

The Local Authority will consider these Regulations applicable, so far as they can be applied, to all Vessels in the Harbours and Creeks of the Parish, in terms of the 29th & 30th sections of the Statute.

GENERAL ORDER.

No. 1202 of 1859.—His Excellency the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following report from Lieutenant G. Hawthorn, Commanding Field Detachment 24th Bombay Native Infantry, of operations against the rebels at Gonda, on the 19th June 1859.

SIR, Morar, July 18, 1859.

I HAVE the honour to forward a report from Lieutenant Hawthorn, of the 24th Bombay Native Infantry, of operations conducted by him against rebels. I shall feel obliged by your bringing prominently to the notice of the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief the zeal and perseverance of Lieutenant Hawthorn, resulting in the complete defeat and dispersal of a body of rebels.

Lieutenant George S. Hawthorn to the Brigade-Major, 2d Brigade Gwalior Division, Jhansie.

SIR, Camp, Mow Ranypoor, 3d July 1859.

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of Colonel Lockhart, C.B., Commanding 2d Brigade Gwalior Division, that, according to my instructions, I arrived at Torri Futtepoor on the morning of the 15th June last. I there was informed that the rebels, amounting to some 50 cavalry, and between 200 and 300 infantry, under their leaders Burgoor Sing, Chutter Sing, and Desput, had left the Goorserai Districts, and proceeded across the Gosis Desanne to the Hummerpoor Districts. I therefore determined, in concert with Major Davies, Commanding the

Jhansie Military Police, to follow them up, and co-operate with Captain Sawyera, of the Police in that district.

I accordingly marched on Mow Ranypoor, where the intelligence above-mentioned was confirmed; left Mow for Alipora on the morning of the 18th ultimo; and the following day moved on to Jorun. About twelve o'clock mid-day, intelligence was brought from Alipora that the rebels, under Burgoor and Chutter Sing, were collected at Gonda, on the banks of the River Desanne, some 500 strong. We immediately struck camp, and marched, via Alipora, on Gonda; the strength of my detachment being as per margin,* that of Major Davies, as near as I can say, as per margin † also.

We arrived at Gonda about 4.30 P.M., where we found the rebels, as reported, encamped on the left bank of the river, with dense jungle in their rear. I immediately ordered skirmishers to the front, under Ensign Holland, 24th Native Infantry, and drove the rebels through a dense jungle, some two miles I should say, on to another ghât further up the river, of the existence of which we were unaware. At this place they recrossed the river, and commenced a sharp fire upon us, but more particularly on the cavalry, who were in the open; however, we drove them out of their position; and then the cavalry, under Major Davies, took up the pursuit.

The success was complete; the rebels were completely defeated and dispersed, with, I am glad to say, no casualty on my side. A sowar of Major Davies, I regret to say, had two fingers cut off while attacking one of the rebels with his spear. About ten or twelve of the enemy were killed, amongst whom was Jowahier, a foster brother of Burgoor Sing, and a man of very determined appearance. Many others were wounded, but hard to state how many, on account of the dense jungle, and nullahs innumerable, which favoured their escape.

I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the officers, non-commissioned officers, and men under my command during this day's work, and more particularly my thanks are due to Ensign Holland, for the steady way in which he led the skirmishers, driving all before him, and eventually enabling the cavalry to take up the pursuit when infantry were of no further use, and to which I attribute the great success of the day.

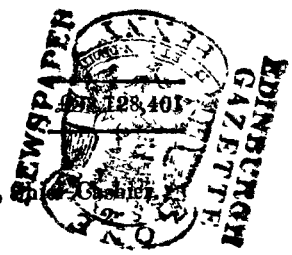
