A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the fifteenth day of December next; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said fifteenth day of December next, to Tuesday the twenty-fourth day of January next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our royal will and pleasure that the said Parliament shall, on the said Tuesday the twenty-fourth day of January next, assemble and be holden for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Tuesday the twentyfourth day of January next.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this twentyninth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fiftynine, and in the twenty-third year of Our reign.

Her Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Most Noble Francis, Duke of Bedford, K.G., to be Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the county of Bedford, his Grace this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty was graciously pleased, by Her Royal Proclamation, bearing date the thirtieth day of April last, to promise and declare that the Bounties of Ten Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Five Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for Her Majesty's Service, should be paid, in the manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the age of forty-five nor under the age of twenty years, who should, on or before the fifteenth day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in Her Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Her Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for raising men for the service of the Royal Navy: and whereas Her Majesty was also graciously pleased, by Her said Proclamation, to declare that all Able-bodied Landsmen, not above the age of twenty-five nor under the age of twenty years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the sum of Forty Shillings each man as Her Majesty's Royal Bounty:

And whereas the time limited for payment of the said Bounties, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, was, by Order in Council of the eleventh day of June last, pro-longed and extended from the said fifteenth day of June to the thirty-first day of July last; and whereas, by two other Orders in Council, the said Bounties have been since reduced to Eight Pounds and Four Pounds respectively, and lastly to Six Pounds and Three Pounds respectively; and the time limited for the payment of the said last-mentioned reduced Bounties was prolonged and extended to the 30th day of November instant; and it being judged expedient for Her Majesty's Service that such Bounties should, so far as they relate to Able Seamen and Ordinary Seamen, be continued to be paid for some time longer Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy doth therefore order, and it is hereby according ordered, that the time limited for payner ordered, that the time limited for payof the said Bounties of Six Pounds to Al

be prolonged and extended from the first day of December next to the thirty-first day of January next inclusive; Whereof all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The Queen has (upon the petition of the Reverend George Staunton Simcockes, Clerk, and Robert Few, Gentleman, his trustees,) been pleased to give and grant unto George Staunton Lynch, (a minor,) eldest son of Henry Cormick Lynch, late of Leigh Park, in the county of Hants, Esquire, deceased, who was the second son of Mark Lynch, of Duras Park, in the county of Galway, in that part of the United Kingdom of Greet British and Iroland Great Britain and Ireland called Ireland, by Victoire, his wife, daughter of Riehard Wolsley Cormick, of Wolsley Park, in the Island of Grenada, Esquire, deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of his cousin, Sir George Thomas Staunton, of Leigh Park aforesaid, Baronet, deceased, henceforth take the surname of Staunton in addition to and after his present surname of Lynch, and bear the arms of Staunton quarterly, in the first quarter, with those of Lynch, and that the said surname and arms may in like manner be taken and borne by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, December 2, 1859.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, enclosing a translation of an order of the Neapolitan Board of Health, subjecting vessels, arriving with healthy passage, from the ports of Dantzig and Antwerp, to a rigorous quarantine, for cholera, of ten days, with purification of cargoes in a lazaret of the first class. The same order subjects vessels arriving from those places, and having had sickness on board, to a refusal of pratique; and requires vessels coming from other ports of Belgium and Prussia to perform a quarantine of ten days, with the airing of wearing apparel on board the vessel.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires in Chili, inclosing a translation of a Decree of the Chilian Minister of Finance, permitting the introduction of Arms and Warlike Stores, with the exception of Mining Gunpowder, into the port of Valparaiso alone,

and by special license only. The same Decree prohibits all vessels having such articles on board, act intended for their own use, from remaining in any port of the Republic, and notifies that the re-bonding of any such stores already in the boaded warehouses will not be permitted.
