the white light, when seen in any direction from the westward, is to be regarded as a warning light, and is not intended to encourage an attempt to pass between Islay and Oronsay, but to indicate a vessel's position, so as to enable her to keep an

offing. The red light which shows in the direction of Colonsay, indicates to vessels their approach to that Island when navigating the northern part of the Sound of Islay. The white light, when seen in any direction from the eastward, is a leading light for the Sound.
