NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 61.)—NORTH SEA—COAST OF BELGIUM.

Fixed Light at Ostende.

In reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 38, dated the 23d September 1859, the Belgian Government has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of January 1860, a light will be exhibited from the new light tower recently erected at Ostende, at about 820 yards E., 9° N. (true), of the old lighthouse.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, visible from a vessel seaward, when bearing between E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. and S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. It will be elevated 189 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 20 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the first order.

The light tower is 170 feet high, and stands in lat. 51° 14' 25" N., long. 2° 55' 57" East of Greenwich.

At the same date, the present light at the north-east corner of the town, and also the tide light on the downs to the eastward of the harbour, will cease to be exhibited.

[The bearings are magnetic. Variation 20° W. in 1859.]

Signals exhibited from the Skaw Light Tower for Drift Ice in the Kattegat.

THE Danish Royal Marine Board has given notice that, this winter and in future, instead of the signal for Ice in the Kattegat, hitherto given by a white and blue flag on the Skagen or Skaw old lighthouse, signals will be made for Drift Ice in the Kattegat, in the Viuga Skærgaard, and in the entrance to the Sound, by means of a Signal Apparatus on the Skaw new light tower, as soon and as long as the Ice is supposed by its extent or quantity to obstruct the navigation of these waters.

The signals will be made by four *black* tables on a *white* board set up towards the Sleeve or Skagerak, in the wall of the light tower, beneath the gallery.

On the Hanstholm lighthouse in future no signal will be given for Ice in the Kattegat.

If the Light Vessel in the Læsö channel leaves her station for other reasons than on account of the Ice, a large *Red* Ball, as hitherto, will be hoisted on the Skaw old lighthouse until the vessel has again resumed her station. This signal will be repeated from the Hirstholm light tower.

Ice in the Great Belt, and in Aarhus bay, will for the future be signalled by a *white* flag with a *blue* perpendicular stripe on the flag-staff, at Forness lighthouse ; and for Ice in the northern part of the entrance to the Great Belt and in the fairway west of Hielm Island, a similar flag will be hoisted on the flag-staff at Hielm lighthouse.
