Copy of a letter from Admiral KINGSMILL, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels on the coast of Ireland, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated at Cork the 4th instant.

SIR,

I have the pleasure to inform their Lordships of the French ship privateer Bellegarde being captured and sent in here by his Majesty's ship *Phœbe*. I inclose a copy of Captain Barlow's letter to me on the occasion, and have the honour to be, &c. R. KINGSMILL.

SIR,

Phœbe, at sea, Feb. 27.

I have to acquaint you, that on the 21st instant, his Majesty's ship under my command captured the French ship privateer Bellegarde, of fourteen guns and one hundred and fourteen men, belonging to St Maloes; she had been out sixteen days, and had captured the ship *Chance* of London, from Martinico, and the brig *Friends*

of Dartmouth, from St Michaels bound to Bristol; the former since recaptured by his Majesty's sloop *Kangaroo*.
