I have to acquaint you, that on the 21st instant, his Majesty's ship under my command captured the French thip privateer Bellegarde, of fourteen guns and one hundred and fourteen men, belonging to St Maloes; fle-had been out fixteen days, and had captured the ship Chance of London, from Martinico, and the brig Friends

of Dartmauth, from St Michaels bound to Brillol; the former fince recaptured by his Majesty's sloop Kangaroo.
