A FEW NOTES having appeared forged in imitation of the FIVE SHILLINGS NOTES of the THISTLE BANK COMPANY of GLASGOW, dated the 10th January 1798, a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS STERLING is hereby offered to any person who will, within three months of this date, give such information as that the Forger, or those who issued such Notes, knowing them to be forged, may be brought to justice, to be paid on conviction of the offender or offenders.

The forgery is in imitation of said Company's Five Shilling Notes of the above date, having the letter B under the N^o. and may be distinguished by having none of the Stamps which are on the genuine Notes, and also by the appearance of the copperplate and difference of the paper.

The discovery of such Forgeries is not only an act of justice to the Public, but of humanity to the Poor, who are most exposed to suffer by the fraud.
