INDIA OFFICE, July 20, 1860.

THE Secretary of State for India in Council has received from the Government of Bombay, a Despatch, from which the following is an Extract :—

Bombay, January 9, 1860.

In the copy of the Minute recorded by our President relative to the services of civilians, and military officers in Civil employ, during the recent troubles in India, which has appeared in the public prints in England, there is an error which we would wish to rectify. In that paragraph of the Minute which alludes to the assistance which our President states he received from his colleagues, there followed the words, "and from the Secretaries to Government." In the Minute as published in England, the passage alluded to runs thus, "and from the Secretary to Government." * This error may have occurred from a mistake of the copyist either in Calcutta or in England, or it may have been a misprint in the London Gazette, but under any circumstances we think it an act of justice to point out that our President's acknowledgments referred to all the Secretaries to Government.

The Queen has been pleased to nominate the Reverend John Frederick Denison Maurice, M.A., to the Ministry of Oxford Chapel, in the parish of Saint Mary-le-bone, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of London, void by the death of the Reverend Edward Scobell.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto Sir George Nathaniel Broke, of Broke Hall, in the parish of Nacton, and of Shrubland Park, in the parish of Barham, both in the county of Suffolk, Baronet, Captain in the Royal Navy, and Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, fourth son of Sir Philip Bowes Vere Broke, Baronet, by Sarah Louisa, youngest but only surviving daughter of Sir William Middleton, afterwards Sir William Fowle-Middleton, of Shrubland Park aforesaid, Baronet, and heir to his brother Sir Philip Broke, Baronet, all deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may, in compliance with an injunction con-

tained in a codicil to the last will and testament of his said maternal grandfather Sir William Fowle-Middleton, Baronet, deceased, henceforth take the surname of Middleton, in addition to and after his surname of Broke, and also bear the arms of Middleton, quarterly, in the first quarter, with those of Broke; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And further, to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in the College of Arms.

SCOTTISH UNIVERSITIES COMMISSION.

At Edinburgh, the Twenty-fifth Day of June Eighteen Hundred and Sixty Years.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, Chapter Eighty-three, intituled 'An Act to make Provision for the better Government and Discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and improving and regulating the Course of Study therein; and for the Union of the Two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen,' the Commissioners for the Purposes of the said Act are empowered to revise the respective Foundations, Mortifications, Bursaries, and Donations, bestowed on any of the Universities or Colleges mentioned in the said Act, or for the Benefit of any Professors, Students, or others therein; and, further, if in the Case of any such Gift or Endowment which has taken Effect for more than Fifty Years, and has been held by any of the said Universities or Colleges, or by any other Person in Trust for or on behalf of the same, or of any Persons therein, it shall appear to the Commissioners that the Interests of Religion and Learning, and the main Design of the Donor, so far as consistent with the Promotion of such Interests may be better advanced by an Alteration of the Conditions or Directions affecting such Gift or Endowment, to alter or modify such Conditions or Directions, and to frame a new Statute or Ordinance for the Application of such Gift or Endowment, in such manner as may better advance the Purposes thereof; and whereas by Deed of Mortification,
