THE Right Honourable Sir George Cornewall Lewis, Bart., has received the following Dispatch from the Right Honourable Lord John Russell, dated Coburg, September 26th, 1860:-

Coburg, September 26, 1860.

HER Majesty The Queen, The Prince Consort, and The Princess Alice, embarked at Gravesend, in the Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert, on Saturday the 22d instant, at half-past five P.M., and arrived here at five P.M. yesterday. His Majesty The King of the Belgians came on board the Royal Yacht at Antwerp at half-past seven A.M., on Monday the 24th, and accompanied The Queen as far as Verviers.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent of

Prussia joined The Queen at Aix-la-Chapelle, and accompanied Her Majesty as far as Duren.

Her Majesty slept that night at Frankfort, and travelled on to Coburg yesterday. Her Majesty was received by the Duke and Duchess of Coburg and Gotha, and had the satisfaction of finding The Prince and Princess Frederick-William of Prussia

waiting Her arrival.

Wherever the Train stopped immense crowds were assembled, who took every opportunity to demonstrate their sincere respect for The Queen.

Notwithstanding the length of the journey, Her Majesty remains in perfect health.

The festivities which had been prepared at Coburg, by order of the Duke of Coburg, have been countermanded, in consequence of the lamented decease of The late Duchess Dowager of Coburg.

TREASURY WARRANT.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas farther powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 44 An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Acts, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows:—

- 1. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation, or posted in the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation, addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any part of the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation (the conveyance between the United Kingdom and the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation being by British packet-boat), there shall be charged and taken an uniform rate of British postage of one shilling.
- 2. On every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to any part of the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation, transmitted by the post between any port in the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation, and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any Foreign Country, through the United King-

dom (the conveyance between the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation and the United Kingdom being by British packet-boat), there shall be charged and taken a British rate of postage of one shilling for the conveyance of every such letter between any port in the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation and any part of the United Kingdom, and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the Colony or Foreign Country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such Colony or Foreign Country; provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted from the said rate of one shilling the sum of one penny, in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause, of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

- 3. On every letter, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by British packet-boat from any port in the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation to any other Foreign port, without passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken a British rate of postage of one shilling.
- 4. All such respective letters, so transmitted as hereinbefore in this Warrant mentioned, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, (that is to say):—
 - On every such letter, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage.
 - And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.
 - And on every such letter, if exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.
 - And for every additional ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional ounce shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.
- 5. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service are now by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.
- 6. The respective letters transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall

be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 19th day of February 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

- 7. The rates of postage chargeable on letters transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.
- 8. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any letters sent between the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation and France, or sent otherwise than in closed mails between the Republic of the Uruguay or the Argentine Confederation and any Foreign Country or British Colony, through France.
- 9. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.
- 10. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.
- 11. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January 1861.

(No. 29.) NORTH ATLANTIC.—NEWFOUNDLAND.

Revolving Light at Cape St Mary's.

The Board of Works at Newfoundland has given notice, that from and after the 20th September 1860, a revolving light will be exhibited from a lighthouse erected on Cape St Mary's.

The light is a revolving light, producing alternately every minute a brilliant red and white light, placed at an elevation of 325 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 30 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric of the first order.

The lighthouse is of brick, and on each side of it are the dwellings of the keepers, the sides of which are painted white, and the roofs red. Its position is in lat. 46° 49′ 25″ N., long. 54° 8′ 45″ W. of Greenwich.

Revolving Light at Cape Bonavista.

Also, that on and after the 1st October next, the interval between each flash of red and white light at Cape Bonavista lighthouse will be one minute and a half, instead of two minutes as at present.

(No. 30.) NORTH ATLANTIC.—UNITED STATES.

Fixed Light on Minot's Ledge.

The United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 15th November 1860, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the outer Minot's ledge, one of the Cohasset rocks, at the entrance of Boston Bay.

The light is a fixed white light, at an elevation of 84 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the second order.

The lighthouse is of dark grey granite, surmounted by a bronze lantern; the height of the whole 112 feet. It stands in lat. 42° 16′ 9″ N., long. 70° 45′ 14″ W. of Greenwich.

Discontinuance of Lights.

Also, that from and after the 15th November 1860 the light at Scituate will be discontinued, and the light-vessel now stationed off Minot's ledge will be removed.
