#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 24.)—ENGLAND.—WEST COAST.

Bann Shoal, off the Lands End.

The Bann Shoal is a narrow rocky ridge, about three-quarters of a mile long, in a N.N.E. and S.S.W. direction, with irregular depths of 8 to 20 fathoms on it at low water springs. From the least depth, 8 fathoms, which is near the south-west end of the shoal, St Ives Head or Battery Point bears S.E. by S., and is distant  $12\frac{1}{2}$  miles; Gurnards Head S. by E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E., 10 miles; and Sennec church is in line with the extreme of the high-water mark at Cape Cornwall, S. by W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W., 12 miles.

Cape Cornwall Bank, which was discovered by Captain Sheringham, R.N., in 1839, lies S.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W., 6 miles from the Bann Shoal. It is a narrow ridge, about 3 miles long, N.N.E. and S.S.W., and like the Bann has irregular depths on it, varying from 13 to 20 fathoms at low water.

*Caution.*—As the sea breaks heavily both on the Bann Shoal and Cape Cornwall Bank in bad weather, particularly during north-west gales, their locality should at that time be avoided, especially by small and heavily-laden vessels. The coast being so far distant, no good marks can be given for clearing them; but, in proceeding round the Lands End to the northward, if the weather be clear the Longships lighthouse kept on a S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. bearing will lead a mile to the westward of the Cape Cornwall Bank; the Brisons islets S. by W., or at night the Longships light dipping and bearing S. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. will lead between the Shoals; and Cape Cornwall S.S.W. will lead a mile to the eastward of the Bann Shoal.

Bristol Channel, North Shore.

A ledge of rocks has lately been discovered in the Nash Passage, between the Nash Sands and Dunraven Head, on the northern shore of the

Bristol Channel. It has only  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 fathoms on it at low water, and should be carefully avoided by the vessels which have hitherto hugged the shore to avoid the Nash Sands.

A rock with  $5\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on it has also been found lying a few fathoms to the southward of the line of the Nash lights nearly in one, S.E. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., and distant from them  $5\frac{1}{4}$  miles.

#### East Breaker, Rockall.

Information has reached the Admiralty that a breaker lying E.S.E. from 5 to 10 miles from Rockall, off the west coast of the Hebrides, Scotland, has recently been observed. The breaker is laid down in an Admiralty chart of the Rockall Bank, made in H.M.S. *Leonidas*, in the year 1812. The Mariner is cautioned to give this danger a wide berth.

##### Revolving Light on Agön Island.

The Royal Administration of Maritime Affairs at Stockholm has given notice, that on and after the 10th of September 1860, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the eastern point of Agön Island, off Hudikswall.

The light *revolves* every two minutes, showing during the interval three short but vivid flashes,

and should be seen in clear weather from N.N.W. round by north and east to S.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., from a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The lighthouse consists of a dwelling-house, surmounted by a wooden tower and lantern, 95 feet above the level of the sea. The tower is painted white and the base red; there are also two out-buildings, the one painted red, the other whitewashed, and serve as good landmarks by day. Its position is in lat.  $61^{\circ} 33'$  N., long.  $17^{\circ} 29'$  E. of Greenwich.
