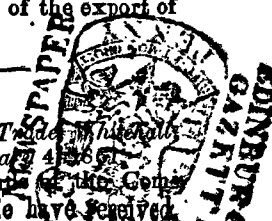

from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, translations of notices issued by the Lisbon Board of Health, which have been received from Her Majesty's Consul at that Port, to the following effect :—

1. The port of Bahia is considered to be suspected of infection with the yellow fever, as from the 29th November last.

All the other ports of Brazil are considered to be clean, with the exception of Rio de Janeiro and Para, which continue to be suspected.

2. The port of Loanda is considered to be infected with yellow fever, and all the other ports of the province of Angola suspected of the same disease.

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury having certified to the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt that there was no surplus of Actual Revenue over the Actual Expenditure of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the year ended the 30th day of September 1860 :

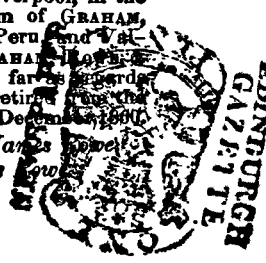
