The Gentlemen to wear black full-trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thursday the 24th instant, viz. :-

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans and Tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 31st instant the Court to go out of Mourning.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, enclosing a translation of a Notice published in the official journal of that city on the 10th instant, providing that merchants importing wheat and other cereals for warehousing, shall enjoy the following privileges:-

- 1. Facilities for hiring warehouses.
- 2. The right of re-exporting the said grain to other Italian ports, or to Foreign countries. The ports at present authorized to have such warehouses are Naples, Castellamare, Paolo, Pizzo, Cotrone, Taranto, Brindisi, and Pescara.
