(No. 16.)—MEDITERRANEAN—MAJORCA, EAST COAST.

Fixed Light on Aucanada Island.

The Minister of Marine at Madrid has given Notice, that on and after the 15th day of May 1861 a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the east and highest part of the Island of Aucanada, in Alcudia Bay, east coast of Majorca.

The light will be a *fixed* light, placed at an elevation of 77 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from the deck of a ship at a distance of 9 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the sixth order.

The tower is circular, 49 feet high, painted white, and surmounted by a white lantern. It rises from the centre of the keeper's dwelling, and its position is in lat. 39° 49' 50" N., long. 3° 12' 24" East of Greenwich.

Fixed Light at Corunna.

The Minister of Marine at Madrid has given Notice, that on and after the 15th day of May 1861 a light will be exhibited from a tower recently erected on the platform of the castle of St Antonio, at the north side of the entrance to Corunna.

The light will be a white *fixed* light, placed at an elevation of 56 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from the deck of a ship at a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses of the fifth order.

The tower is 20 feet high, painted green, and surmounted with a white lantern. It rises from the centre of the keeper's dwelling, which is also painted green; and stands in lat. 43° 22' 0" N., long. 8° 23' 6" West of Greenwich.

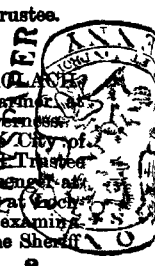
