The following Address of Condolence to the Queen, on the occasion of the death of Her late Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for presentation, has been presented accordingly to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously:—

To The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Association of the Nonsubscribing Presbyterians of Ireland, assembled at our Annual Meeting, most humbly beg leave to tender to your Majesty the expression of our heartfelt sympathy and condolence with your Majesty, under the affliction occasioned by the demise of your Majesty's illustrious Mother, Her late Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent.

The christian graces which, in every part of her varied history, Her Royal Highness was enabled to manifest, endeared her to all ranks and classes of your Majesty's subjects, and will long live in their memories. From your Majesty's filial heart the love and reverence which you ever cherished for the Mother who watched over your early years

with more than maternal solicitude, will never be effaced. Whereas in certain cases ships navigating in ballast from ports or places within the United Kingdom, to other ports or places within the United Kingdom, are not exempted from compulsory pilotage,—

And whereas it is expedient that such ships should have the privilege of being exempt from pilotage in the cases hereinafter mentioned,—

And whereas by the 332d section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that "every pilotage authority shall have power, by bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, to exempt the masters of any ships, or of any classes of ships, from being compelled to employ qualified pilots, and to annex any terms and conditions to such exemptions,"—

And whereas the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, being a pilotage authority, hath submitted for the consent of Her Majesty in Council the following bye-law, viz. :—

"That all ships navigating in ballast from any port or place in the United Kingdom, to any other port or place in the United Kingdom, shall, when not carrying passengers, be exempt from compulsory pilotage within the pilotage jurisdiction of the said Trinity House."

Now therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said bye-law into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, to declare Her consent to the same,

and the said bye-law is hereby approved accordingly.

Whereas by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions in, by, and subject to which the light dues, authorized to be levied by the said Act, are paid and collected :

And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting and about to light a new lighthouse on St. Abb's Head, in the county of Berwick :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that upon the completion and lighting of the said light, there shall be paid in respect of the said light for every British vessel, and for every Foreign vessel privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom, upon paying the same dues as are payable by British vessels, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for every time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an over-sea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage; and for every Foreign vessel, not privileged in manner hereinbefore mentioned, double the amount of the respective tolls hereinbefore specified, according to the voyage on which she may be employed; and that the said tolls in respect of the said lighthouse shall be levied by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, subject to the gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. on vessels engaged in over-sea voyages, and of thirty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the second day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and subject also, on and after the first day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to the further abatement or discount of ten per cent. on vessels engaged in over-sea voyages, and of twenty-five per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said recited Act, and bearing the same date as this present Order, and subject also, from and after the completion and lighting of the said light, to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Dues sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption, sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the twelfth day of April one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

And whereas by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said Act, and dated the second day of February one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it was directed that, until Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, might see fit otherwise to determine, there should be allowed to every person paying the dues mentioned in the said consolidated tables, so approved as aforesaid, a further abatement or discount upon the amount payable by him ; which further abatement or discount should, in the case of every over-sea vessel be ten per cent., making, together with the aforesaid abatements of twenty-five per cent. and fifteen per cent. respectively, allowed by the said recited Order, a gross abatement or discount of fifty per cent. upon the amount of the dues specified in the said consolidated tables, and payable in respect of such over-sea vessel ; and which further abatement or discount should, in the case of every coasting-vessel, be ten per cent., making, together with the aforesaid abatements of ten per cent. and fifteen per cent. respectively, allowed by the said recited Orders, a gross abatement or discount of thirty-five per cent. upon the amount of the dues specified in the said consolidated tables, and payable in respect of such coasting-vessel :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said Light Dues may be further reduced without injury to the services in respect of which such dues are levied :

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," is pleased to direct that the said Light Dues shall, on and after the first day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, be further reduced as follows, that is to say, until Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, may see fit otherwise to determine, there shall be allowed to every person paying the dues mentioned in the said consolidated tables, so approved as aforesaid by the said Order in Council of the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, a further abatement or discount upon the amount payable by him, which further abatement or discount shall, in the case of every over-sea vessel, be ten per cent., making, together with the aforesaid abatements of twenty-five per cent., fifteen per cent., and ten per cent. respectively, allowed by the said recited Orders, a gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent. upon the amount of the dues specified in the said consolidated tables, and payable in respect of such over-sea vessel ; and which further abatement or discount shall, in the case of every coasting-vessel, be twenty-five per cent., making, together with the aforesaid abatements of ten per cent., fifteen per cent., and ten per cent. respectively, allowed by the said recited Orders, a gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent. upon the amount of the dues specified in the said consolidated tables, and payable in respect of such coasting-vessel.

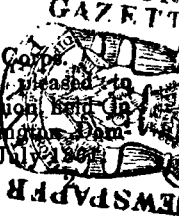
