WHITEHALL, April 10, 1862.

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Allan Cowburn, Clerk, Vicar of Tidenham, in the county of Gloucester, son of William Cowburn, late of Sydenham, in the county of Kent, Esquire, deceased, by Catherine Rebecca his wife, daughter of George Smith, and sister of William Masters Smith, both of Camer, in the parish of Meopham, in the county of Kent, Esquire, deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a direction of his said maternal uncle, William Masters Smith, henceforth take and use the surnames of Smith and Masters, and be called Allan Smith Masters, and bear the arms of Masters and Smith quarterly, and also bear the crests of Masters and Smith, and that such surnames, arms, and crests may be borne and used by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
