Board of Trade, Whitehall, September 4, 1862.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a

copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Lisbon, enclosing a translation of a Portuguese Royal Decree, authorising the free importation into Portugal of Foreign cereals, wheat, Indian corn, rye, barley, oats, flour, and baked bread, until the end of April 1862, subject, when entered for home consumption, to the same amount of duties as are paid upon the like articles produced in Portugal.

The free importation of the above articles will be permitted after the expiration of the above period, in cases where they have been exported directly from the port of shipment with a reasonable prospect of arrival within the time prescribed.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, September 4, 1862.

The Right Honourable the Lord of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid, enclosing a translation of a Spanish Royal Order, sanctioning the importation of cod fish arriving direct from the fisheries, in vessels which may have touched during the voyage at some place where such fisheries do not exist. It is required however, that such vessels should possess all the papers required by the regulations on the subject of fisheries, and that the masters should have a certificate from the Council at the port at which they may have touched, declaring that the vessels called for orders only, and performed no operation of loading or unloading.

New Buoys in Solent Channel.

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby give notice that, with a view of facilitating the navigation of the Solent Channel, the following buoys have been placed on the Salt Mead and Black Rock ledges, off the northern shore of the Isle of Wight, and that the Hamsted ledge buoy, on the same shore, has been shifted to the north-east end of the ledge.

Salt Mead Ledge.

A *white* buoy is placed in 5 fathoms at low water on the north-east edge of the ledge, with Egypt point bearing E. $\frac{3}{4}$ N., (the Gurnet buoy appears a little outside the point); Eaglehurst tower a little within Stansore point, N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.; Lepe coast-guard houses N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.; Pitts Deep coast-guard houses N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., nearly; Hurst high lighthouse W. $\frac{3}{8}$ N.; centre of the Mount trees (east end of Yarmouth), on outer extreme of Hamsted point, W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; North Close farm-house S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; and Hamsted ledge buoy W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., distant 2 miles.

Black Rock Ledge.

A *white* buoy is placed in 10 fathoms water a little outside and to the northward of the Black rock, off Yarmouth, with the high tower of the Refuge in Yarmouth in line with the north-east end of the Castle-wall bearing S.E. easterly; Yarmouth church S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; Sconce point W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.; Hurst high light-house W. by N. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.; Lyminster church, North; and Hamsted ledge buoy, East. There are only 6 feet at low water about 47 yards inside the buoy.

Hamsted Ledge.

The *white* buoy on this ledge has been moved rather more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables to the north-eastward, and now lies in 5 fathoms on the north-east end of the ledge, with North Close farm-house in line

with North beacon at entrance of Newtown river, S.E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.; Egypt point E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. (Gurnet buoy is nearly on with the point); Pitts Deep coast-guard houses N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; Lymington church N.W.; Hurst high lighthouse W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.; Sconce point West, northerly; and the highest part of the Mount trees at Yarmouth just southward of the south part of Hill trees, W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S.
