**T**HE following Addresses of Congratulation to the Queen, on the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for Presentation, have accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

To The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Bishop and Clergy of the diocese of Manchester, beg leave to approach your Majesty with sentiments of the sincerest loyalty and attachment.

No event which nearly affects your Majesty's happiness can ever be viewed by us without the deepest interest; and it is with the most heartfelt sympathy that we now come forward respectfully to offer our unanimous and cordial congratulations on the marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark; an alliance founded, as we firmly believe, on real affection, formed under the brightest auspices, and one in every respect so agreeable to your Majesty.

It is our fervent prayer that Almighty God may graciously be pleased to shower down upon this union His choicest blessings; and that it may be productive of increasing happiness both to the Royal Family and to the Nation at large.

We would also dutifully avail ourselves of this opportunity of expressing our thankfulness for the mercies vouchsafed to the Princess Royal of Prussia, and the Princess Louis of Hesse, in the additions which have recently been granted to the Royal Family. And we would humbly hope that these repeated instances of the Divine favour may have the effect in some degree of alleviating that deep-seated sorrow with which it has pleased the Great Disposer of Events, in His mercy and wisdom, to visit your Majesty, in common with ourselves and the rest of your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects.
