THE Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., has received the following Despatch and Telegraphic Communication from Earl Granville:—

Brussels, August 13, 1863.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to inform you that Her Majesty the Queen, accompanied by their Royal Highnesses Prince Alfred, Prince Leopold, Princess Helena, and Princess Beatrice, embarked at 6 P.M., on the 11th instant, on board Her Majesty's yacht Victoria and Albert, at Greenhithe.

Immediately after their embarkation the Royal yacht proceeded down the river, and arrived at Antwerp at 2 P.M., on the following day.

The Queen immediately landed, and proceeded by a special train to Lacken, where Her Majesty arrived at a quarter before four o'clock.

Her Majesty was met at the Lacken Railway Station by His Majesty the King of the Belgians, and their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Brabant.

In compliance with Her Majesty's wish, all guards of honour and other formalities were dispensed with.

The Queen proposes to resume Her journey to Coburg on the 14th instant.

I am happy to add that Her Majesty and the rest of the Royal Family have not suffered from the fatigues of the journey.

Board of Trade, Whitehall,

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a translation of a decree of the Chilian Government, fixing, as follows, the charges to be levied for the storage of merchandize, and which has been forwarded by Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Santiago.

The duty of storage to be levied, according to the 2d Art. of the law of December 24, 1855, for each month of deposit upon packages of merchandize, subject to weight, size, and space, shall be levied from the 1st of January 1863, under the following weights and measures:—

The merchandize, subject to weight, shall pay 2 cents for 46 kilogrammes.

The packages of merchandize subject to measurement shall pay

From 28 to 57	décimètres cubio	1½ cents,
" 57	113	" 3
" 113	227	" 6
" 227	240	" 9
" 240	453	" 12
" 453	566	" 15

Those packages which may exceed 566 cubic décimètres, shall pay duty according to the foregoing proposition.

Packages of space for liquids in vessels not under four litres shall pay one third of a cent, for every three litres seventy-eight centilitres, ($\frac{3}{100}$).

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a translation of a Spanish Royal Decree forwarded by Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Madrid, authorising the establishment of bonded warehouses at that capital, and of which the following are the most important provisions :—

1st.—The Madrid Docks Company are empowered hereby to establish at this capital and in the warehouses which they possess in the neighbourhood of the Central Custom-house, a bonded warehouse for goods whose importation is permitted, to the exclusion of all others, in consideration of the Board of Agriculture, Industry, and

Commerce, having pledged their rights on behalf of the Company.

2d.—It is understood that this concession is to be for at least five years, in conformity with the provisions of Article 308 of the regulations, unless its continuance be interrupted by any of the causes specified by that article.

3d. That the duty to be paid by goods on their entry into the bonded warehouse, as warehouse dues, shall be that specified in the accompanying tariffs, approved and accepted as they have been by the Board of Agriculture, Industry, and Commerce of this Province, the only body bound to devise the means necessary for the support of the establishment.

And 5th. That the intervention to be exercised by the Central Custom-house in the bonded warehouse shall be that declared in the 8th chapter of the Customs' Regulations.

TARIFF of the Warehouse Dues to be paid on Goods intended for the Bonded Warehouse which is established in Madrid by Royal Order of this date.

SECOND DIVISION.

Goods Warehoused in Bulk.

13. Those in bulk shall pay 50 cents (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ d.) for each 10 kilogrammes (lb. 22.04) during the first month, and 15 cents (0 $\frac{3}{8}$ d.) during each subsequent fortnight.

THIRD DIVISION.

Goods in Sacks.

14. Goods in sacks shall pay 30 cents ($\frac{3}{4}$ d.) for each 10 kilogrammes (lb. 22.04) during the first month, and 12 cents (about $\frac{1}{6}$ d.) during each subsequent fortnight.

FOURTH DIVISION.

15. Liquids in pipes, vessels, or jars, shall pay 50 cents (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ d.) for each 10 kilogrammes (lb. 22.04) during the first month, and 15 cents ($\frac{3}{8}$ d.) during each subsequent fortnight.

FIFTH DIVISION.

16. Inflammable goods and those which are easily damaged shall pay 75 cents (1 $\frac{3}{4}$ d.) for each 10 kilogrammes (lb. 22.04) during the first month, and 50 cents (1 $\frac{1}{4}$ d.) during each subsequent fortnight.

Notes.

1st. The gross weight of the packages shall serve as a basis in fixing the class to which they belong.

2d. Packages which measure more than a cubic metre shall pay according to this tariff, but with strict reference to the weight and capacity.

3d. No goods shall leave the bonded warehouse unless their owner shall have paid the dues incurred by them.
