BY virtue of an Act passed in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to repeal so much of the two Acts made in the tenth and fifteenth years of the reign of his present Majesty as authorizes the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his warrant to the Clerk of the Crown for making out writs for the election of Members to serve in Parliament, in the manner therein mentioned, and for substituting other provisions for the like purposes;" and of an Act passed in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to further limit and define the time for proceeding to Election during the Recess:"

I do hereby give notice, that it hath been certified to me in writing, under the hands of two Members serving in this present Parliament, that Harry George Vane (commonly called Lord Harry Vane), late a Member serving in this present Parliament for the town and port of Hastings, is become a Peer of the United Kingdom, and that a writ of summons has been issued to him, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, to summon him to Parliament; and that I shall issue my warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to make out a new writ for the electing of a Member to serve in this present Parliament for the said town and port, at the end of six days after the insertion of this notice in the London Gazette.

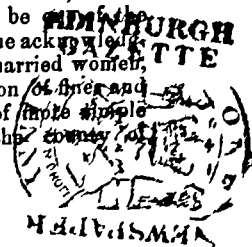

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Drummer of Her Majesty's Army, whose claims to the same have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in New Zealand, as stated against their names ; viz. :—

Regiment.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Royal Artillery ...	Assistant-Surgeon William George Nicholas Manley Date of Act of Bravery, April 29th 1864.	For his conduct during the assault on the Rebel Pah, near Tauranga, New Zealand, on the 29th of April last, in most nobly risking his own life, according to the testimony of Commodore Sir William Wiseman, Bart, C.B., in his endeavour to save that of the late Commander Hay, of the Royal Navy, and others. Having volunteered to accompany the storming party into the Pah, he attended on that Officer when he was carried away, mortally wounded, and then volunteered to return in order to see if he could find any more wounded. It is stated that he was one of the last Officers to leave the Pah.
Royal Artillery ...	Assistant-Surgeon William Temple and Lieutenant Arthur Frederick Pickard Date of Acts of Bravery, November 20th 1863.	For gallant conduct during the assault on the enemy's position at Rangiriri, in New Zealand, on the 20th of November last, in exposing their lives to imminent danger in crossing the entrance of the Maori keep, at a point upon which the enemy had concentrated their fire, with a view to render assistance to the wounded, and more especially to the late Captain Mercer, of the Royal Artillery. Lieutenant Pickard, it is stated, crossed and re-crossed the parapet to procure water for the wounded, when none of the men could be induced to perform this service, the space over which he traversed being exposed to a cross-fire ; and testimony is borne to the calmness displayed by him and Assistant-Surgeon Temple, under the trying circumstances in which they were placed.
57th Regiment ...	Ensign John Thornton Down and Drummer Dudley Stagpoole Date of Acts of Bravery, October 2d 1863.	For their conduct at Pontoko, on the 2d October, in rescuing a wounded comrade from the rebel Maories. They succeeded in bringing in the wounded man, who was lying at about fifty yards from the bush, although the enemy kept up a very heavy fire from the bush at short range, and also from behind fallen logs close at hand. The man had been wounded during an engagement with the rebel natives, and Ensign Down and Drummer Stagpoole responded to the call of the Officer commanding the detachment of the Regiment for volunteers to bring him in. The Medal for distinguished Conduct in the Field has already been conferred on Drummer Stagpoole, for the energy and devotion which he displayed on the 25th September 1863, at the affair near Kaipakopako, in having, though wounded in the head, twice volunteered and brought in wounded men.

"AN ACT TO REGULATE AND AMEND THE LAW
RESPECTING
THE SALMON FISHERIES OF SCOTLAND."
*District of the Rivers CLYDE, and LEVEN, and
ECKAIG.*

WE, the Commissioners appointed under the said Act, and empowered thereby "To fix and define, for the purposes of this Act, and the other Acts relating to Salmon and Salmon Fisheries in Scotland, the natural limits which divide each River in Scotland (including the Estuary thereof) from the Sea, in so far as the same may not be already fixed by Statute or by judicial decision," do hereby fix and define the limit which divides the Rivers CLYDE, AND LEVEN, AND ECKAIG, including the Estuary thereof, from the Sea, to be a straight line drawn due East, true Meridian, from Toward Point Light.

VACCINATION ACT.

PARISH OF UNST, SHETLAND.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, That in terms of the 12th Clause of the Vaccination (Scotland) Act, 1863,—26 and 27 Vict., cap. 108,—and upon application by The PAROCHIAL BOARD of UNST, in Shetland, the Board of Supervision have framed Modifications of the 8th and 9th Clauses of the said Act, as hereinafter expressed, to supersede the provisions in these Clauses so far as regards the said Parish of Unst, and that the said Modifications have been approved of by the Lord Advocate, in conformity with the Act:—

"In the 8th Clause of the said Act, where the word 'Six' occurs, the word 'Twelve' to be substituted for it.

"In the 9th Clause of the said Act, wherever the word 'Two' occurs, the word 'Twelve' to be substituted for it."

Accordingly, the 8th and 9th Clauses of the Vaccination (Scotland) Act, 1863, will stand as follows, so far as regards the Parish of Unst:—

"8. The Father of every Child born in Scotland after the First Day of January in the Year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in the event of the Death, Illness, or Inability of the Father, then the Mother, or in the event of the Death, Illness, Absence, or Inability of the Father and Mother, then the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, shall, within Twelve Months after the Birth of such Child, cause such Child to be vaccinated by a Medical Practitioner, and upon and immediately after the successful Vaccination of such Child the Medical Practitioner who shall have performed the Operation shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or to the Person who shall have the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (A) hereto annexed, that such Child has been successfully vaccinated; and such Certificate shall, within Three Days after the Date thereof, be transmitted to and lodged with the Registrar for the District by the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, and such Certificate, if registered,

shall, without further Proof, be admissible as Evidence of the successful Vaccination of such Child in any Information or Complaint which shall be brought against the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act.

"9. If any Medical Practitioner shall be of opinion that any Child is not in a fit and proper State to be successfully vaccinated, he shall thereupon and immediately deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or the Person having the Care, Nurture, or Custody of such Child, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the Schedule (B) hereto annexed, that the Child is in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, and such Certificate shall remain in Force for Twelve Months from its Delivery as aforesaid; and the Father, Mother, or Person aforesaid shall, unless they shall within each succeeding Period of Twelve Months have obtained from a Medical Practitioner a Renewal of such Certificate, within Twelve Months next after the Delivery of the said Certificate as aforesaid, and if the said Child be not vaccinated at the Termination of such Period of Twelve Months, then during each succeeding Period of Twelve Months until such Child has been successfully vaccinated, cause such Child to be examined by a Medical Practitioner, and if he deem such Child to be then in a fit and proper State for Vaccination, he shall forthwith vaccinate him accordingly, and if the Operation be successful shall deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (A), that such Child has been successfully vaccinated; but if the Medical Practitioner be of opinion that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination, then he shall again deliver to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a Certificate under his Hand, according to the Form of the said Schedule (B), that the Child is still in an unfit State for successful Vaccination; and the Medical Practitioner, so long as such Child remains in an unfit State for Vaccination and unvaccinated, shall at the Expiration of every succeeding Period of Twelve Months deliver, if required, to the Father or Mother of such Child, or Person aforesaid, a fresh Certificate under his Hand, according to the said Form; and the Production of such Certificate shall be a sufficient Defence against any Complaint which shall be brought against the Father or Mother, or Person aforesaid, for Non-compliance with the Provisions of this Act."
