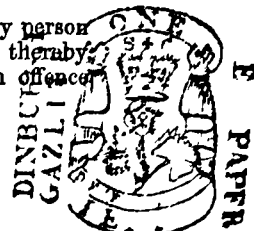
CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Renfrew.

NOTICE is hereby given by the County Board, being the local authority under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the county of Renfrew, that the existing Resolutions and Orders of the Board are continued, and remain in full force within the said county, subject to the modification contained in the following Resolution, adopted by the Board at its meeting held on 31st March 1866, viz. :—

That from and after the date of the publication of this notice it shall not be unlawful to remove any animal (meaning thereby any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine,) from any place within the county of Renfrew to any other place therein, provided that the animal is free of disease, and that the cattle plague does not exist and has not existed at the farm or place from which the animal is to be removed, or within one mile thereof, for at least thirty days preceding the date of removal; and, where the disease has existed, that the place has been disinfected for said period; and further, that the animal when removed shall be accompanied by a declaration signed by the owner, and a certificate signed by two members of the District Committee, to that effect; which declaration and certificate the owner shall be bound immediately to deliver to the Cattle Constable of the district; and provided also, that the animal shall be removed within forty-eight hours after the date of the certificate; but nothing herein contained shall authorise the bringing of any animal as aforesaid, excepting sheep, into the county of Renfrew from any burgh therein, or from any other county or place.

Notice is hereby further given, that any person contravening the above Resolution shall thereby act unlawfully, and shall for every such offence



forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds sterling.

(No. 14.)—IRELAND—SOUTH-WEST COAST.

Flashing Light on Calf Rock.

THE Corporation of the port of Dublin has given notice that on and after the 30th day of June 1866, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the Calf rock, near the west end of Dursey island, at the north side of entrance to Bantry bay, south-west coast of Ireland.

The light will be a *flashing* white light, showing a *flash* every *fifteen seconds*, at an elevation of 141 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 17 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the first order.

The tower is circular, 102 feet high from base to vane, painted red, with a broad white central belt, and stands in lat. 51° 34' 10" N., long. 10° 14' 50" West of Greenwich.
