LORD CHAMBERLAIN'S OFFICE, ST JAMES'S PALACE, March 31, 1866.

NOTICE is hereby given that His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold Levees at St James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Saturday the 12th of May, and on Wednesday the 6th June next, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at these Levees shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT \$T JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at Levees except in accordance with the above regulations.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that it shall and may be lawful for the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to make such Order as they shall see necessary and expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in any particular case or cases, with respect to any vessel arriving and having any infectious disease or distemper on board, or on board of which any infectious disease or distemper may have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection, although such vessel shall not have come from any place from which His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, may have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague, or any such infectious disease or distemper may be brought, and also with respect to the persons, goods, wares, and mer-chandize, and other articles as aforesaid, on board the same; and in case of any infectious disease or distemper appearing or breaking out in the United Kingdom or the islands aforesaid, to make such Orders and give such direction, in order to cut off all com munication between any persons infected with any such disease or distemper, and the rest of the

others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, to be necessary and expedient for that purpose, and likewise to make such Orders as they shall see fit for shortening the time of quarantine to be performed by particular vessels or particular persons, goods, wares, merchandize, or any other articles, or for absolutely or conditionally releasing them, or any of them, from quarantine; and all such Orders so made by the Lords or others of the Privy Council, or any two or more of them, as aforesaid, shall be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as well with respect to the Commander, Master, or other person, having the charge of any vessel, and all other persons on board the same, as with respect to any other persons having any intercourse or communication with them, and to the penalties, forfeitures, and punishments to which they may respectively become liable, as any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, by and with the advice of His or their Privy Council concerning quarantine, notified by proclamation or published in the London Gazette:

And whereas a certain vessel named the "Helvetia," having a certain infectious disease on board, that is to say, the Asiatic Cholera, has arrived, or is expected to arrive at Liverpool; and whereas it is expedient to cut off all communication between persons on board that vessel infected with that disease and the rest of Her Majesty's subjects:

Now therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the above quoted section of the said Act, the Lords of the Council do order,

and it is hereby ordered:

1. That in case of such vessel arriving at Liverpool, having such disease on board, no person shall land from such vessel for the space of three clear days after her arrival at Liverpool, without the permission of the Mayor of Liverpool.

2. The Mayor of Liverpool shall forthwith cause all persons on board the said vessel to be examined by a physician or surgeon, and shall permit all such persons to land immediately who shall be certified by such physician or surgeon to be free from such disease.

3. All persons certified by such physician or surgeon to be affected with symptoms of such disease shall be removed, if their condition admits of it, to some hospital or place to be designated for such purpose by the Mayor of Liverpool; and no person so removed shall quit such hospital or place until some physician or surgeon shall have certified that such person is free from the said disease.

4. All persons offending against this Order shall be liable to such penalties as are imposed by the said Act of Parliament upon persons offending against the provisions thereof.

Whereas by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her sale of cattle is prohibited by the said Order until present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred the first day of June one thousand eight hundred

and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until "the first day of September one thousand "eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of "the then session of Parliament, the spread-"ing of contagious or infectious disorders "among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twentyninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary, for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the " eleventh and twelfth years of Her present " Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infec-" tious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other " animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared and now prevails amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas it is among other things therein ordered by the said Privy Council, that any Local Authority, as to any place within its district shall, by an Order made after the passing of that Order, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists to be an infected place from and after a date to be specified in such Order:

And whereas provisions are contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement, without a licence as therein described, is prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other, and a form of licence for the removal of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, therein called a "Fat Stock Licence," is prescribed in the form therein set forth, and the same cannot be rendered available in respect of the township of Birkenhead hereinafter mentioned:

And whereas the holding of markets for the

and sixty-six, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter:

And whereas there is a market held for the borough of Liverpool, at Stanley, in the township of West Derby, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, called the Liverpool New Cattle Market, which is licenced by the Privy Council under the said Order, until the said first day of June, or until the said licence shall be revoked, subject to certain provisions therein contained:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Chester, being the Local Authority for such county, have duly declared a certain part of the said county, containing, among other places, the township of Birkenhead, the inhabitants whereof are accustomed to resort to the said market for the purchase of cattle, to be an "infected place" within the operation of the said Order, and it is desirable that sanction should be given to the moving of cattle from the said market into the said township for the purpose of immediate slaughter:

Now therefore, the Lords of the Privy Council do hereby order that, until the said first day of June, or until further order in this behalf be sooner made by the Privy Council, any cattle purchased in the said market for immediate slaughter may be moved from the said market into the part of the said township of Birkenhead hereinafter described, so that they are driven, taken, or conveyed along the shortest route from the said market, across the River Mersey, to one of the landing-places at the Woodside or the Birkenhead Ferry, and from such landing-place by the shortest route to the public slaughter-house belonging to the Birkenhead Improvement Commissioners, and there be slaughtered within the space of forty-eight hours after the time of their arrival at such slaughter-house, anything in the said Order of the twenty-fourth of March last to the contrary notwithstanding.

The part of the township above referred to is that part which is bounded on the east by the River Mersey, on the north and west by the north-westerly side of Argyle Street and Wilbraham Street, and on the south by the boundary line between the townships of Birkenhead and Transpage

And the said Lords of the Privy Council do further order, that if any person move any cattle from the said market to the said township of Birkenhead in any other manner than as herein described, or out of the part of the township above described, or shall retain any cattle so removed from the said market unslaughtered, for a longer period than forty-eight hours after arrival at the said slaughter-house, such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Order, and shall incur a penalty, as prescribed in the said Order of the twenty-fourth of March last, for offences against such Order.

And this Order shall be construed as the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last, and all the provisions therein contained not inconsistent with this Order shall be applicable hereto.
