## SPAIN AND PERU.

Raising of Blockade of Port of Callao by Spanish Naval Forces.

### NOTIFICATION.

FOREIGN OFFICE, June 15, 1866.

IT is hereby notified that the Earl of Clarendon, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires in Peru, a Despatch stating that he (the said Chargé d'Affaires) had received from the Commander-in-Chief of the Spanish Naval Forces in the Pacific, a Despatch (dated the 9th May 1866,) announcing the raising of the blockade of the Port of Callao from that date, and of the departure of the Spanish Squadron from Peruvian waters.

The following is an Extract from the said Despatch of the Commander-in-Chief of the Spanish Naval Forces above referred to :—

(Extract.)

Comandancia General de la Escuadra de S.M.C. en el Pacifico.

Fragata "Numancia," Bahía del Callao, y Mayo 9, de 1866.

MUY SENOR MIO,

EL infrascrito tiene la honra de participar al H. S. Don Juan Barton, que desde esta fecha queda levantado el bloqueo del Callao, dejando dicha escuadra las aguas del Peru.

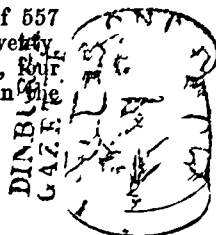

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to confer the decoration of the "Albert Medal" on SAMUEL POPPLESTONE, of Start Farm, in the county of Devon, Farmer.

The following are the services in respect of which the decoration has been conferred, viz. :—

The "Spirit of the Ocean," a barque of 557 tons, with a crew of eighteen hands and twenty-four passengers, was wrecked on the rocks, four hundred yards to the west of Start Point, in the county of Devon, on the 23d March 1866.



The mate and one of the crew were saved by Samuel Popplestone, unaided, and at the imminent risk of his own life.

The circumstances under which this very dangerous service was performed by Mr Popplestone are as follows, viz. :—

The vessel, with a part of her crew sick, and the mates and passengers assisting in working her, was caught in a strong gale from the south-west; and on Friday the 23d March, she was off the Start, in a very dangerous position.

Mr Popplestone observed the peril of the vessel, and knew that if she failed to weather the rocks she must inevitably be lost, and every soul lost with her, unless assistance could be rendered from the shore.

He therefore despatched a messenger on one of his own horses to Tor Cross, to rouse the villagers, and another messenger on horseback to give information to the Coast Guard.

The vessel had by this time struck on the rocks, and had begun to break up rapidly.

Mr Popplestone took a small coil of rope, and alone and unaided, proceeded over the shore from rock to rock until he got near to the vessel. The wind at the time was blowing at force 11, that is, a storm, nearly equal to a hurricane, accompanied by rain, and a very heavy and dangerous sea. Whilst Popplestone was standing on the rock nearest to the vessel, endeavouring to effect a communication with the vessel, he was washed off; but, by a great effort on his part, and by the help of a returning sea, he regained his footing, and from this perilous position he succeeded in saving the lives of two persons, and conveying them beyond the reach of danger.

#### TRANSLATION.

##### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

It is hereby made known to mariners, for their guidance and strict observance, that the I. R. Commander of the Fortress of Zara has taken the following measures for the safety of that place :—

1. The small port near "Porta Mezzo" shall remain entirely closed from the hours of nine at night to half-past four in the morning.
2. Vessels and boats are prohibited from approaching by any part of the canal, either towards the high road or the Porporella.
3. Vessels and boats intending to enter the large port after nightfall or before daybreak, must, before permission can be obtained, come to an anchor in the roadstead, and be admitted to pratique by that I. R. Port and Health Office.

It is, however, to be understood, that the above dispositions do not refer to steam vessels of the Lloyd Company on their making themselves known as such when at a distance.

The Marine Board at Port Adelaide, South Australia, has given notice, that the *red* light on the Semaphore Jetty, Port Adelaide, is now elevated 27 feet above high water, and is visible from seaward, when bearing from N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. round by east to S. E. by S., at a distance of 6 miles.

The light is obscured eastward of the latter bearing, in order to keep vessels a mile westward of the sands, at the outer bar of Port Adelaide creek, as it is in contemplation to remove the light vessel, after the erection of a lighthouse on the south sand of the outer bar, of which due notice will be given.

##### Wonga Shoal.

The Wonga, a sandy shoal, extends in a north-westerly direction from the sand hills southward of the Semaphore. A Bell buoy, painted red, and shaped like a boat—with a staff and ball—has been placed in 17 feet at low water, on its northern extremity—off the end of the Jetty—and may be seen during day at a distance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles. From the buoy the water shoals gradually in a south-easterly direction to the shore.

The buoy should be left to the southward and eastward, but small vessels may cross the shoal southward of the buoy, in 12 feet water, by bringing the Semaphore jetty light to bear E. by S.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S., and anchor according to draft of water off the end of the jetty. Large vessels should avoid crossing the shoal southward of the buoy, by bringing the jetty light to bear S. E. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., and not stand further in than to have the light vessel bearing N.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W.

The best anchorage for large vessels is anywhere northward of the bell buoy, with the light ship bearing from North to N. E. in 4 or 5 fathoms at low water. Vessels waiting for orders will find it convenient to anchor tolerably close to the buoy, whilst those only waiting for tide to pass the bar should anchor with the jetty light bearing S. E., and the light vessel from N. N. E. to N. E. Small vessels may anchor inside the bell buoy with the light vessel bearing from North to N. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., and the jetty light from E. by S. to E.S.E.

It is high water at full and change, at the outer bar of Port Adelaide, at 4h. 30m.; and the rise is about 8 feet. The tidal signals are shown from the Semaphore flagstaff on the hill, but as strangers are required to take a pilot, it is unnecessary to describe them here. The signal for a steam tug is the ensign at the fore. A signalman is stationed on the hill above the inner end of the jetty, to attend to vessels' signals.

## Port Willunga.
