WHEREAS information has been received by Her Majesty's Government that the cattle plague has again appeared in the Province of Friesland, in the Kingdom of the Netherlands, and it has been represented, and it appears to their Lordships, that there is danger of the disorders that have been prevalent among cattle being introduced into or spread in this country by means of cattle coming from the Provinces of Friesland and Groningen, in the territories of His Majesty the King of the Netherlands :

Now, therefore, their Lordships do order that no cattle imported or introduced into the United Kingdom within twenty-one days from the date of this Order from, or which shall have been within, either of the said provinces, or which shall have been on board any vessel or vessels at the same time with any cattle which shall have come from, or shall have been within the said provinces, or either of them, shall be removed from the place where they are landed, except under the superintendence and with the permission of the Officers of Her Majesty's Customs, and then only to some place for the purpose of being immediately slaughtered; and the same and every of them shall be so removed and slaughtered within twenty-four hours after the same shall have been landed :

And further, that all lambs, sheep, goats, or swine, brought or being on the same vessel with any such cattle as hereinbefore mentioned, shall be dealt with in all respects as such last-mentioned cattle :

Provided that all cattle which shall appear to be diseased or affected with any disorder shall and may be dealt with as if this Order had not been made.

That the word "cattle" shall include sheep and lambs, as well as bulls, cows, heifers, and calves.

That the bodies, skins, horns, and hoofs of all such animals so slaughtered shall be buried or otherwise disposed of under the direction of the Commissioners or Officers of Her Majesty's Customs.

That this Order shall be construed in like manner as that of the General Orders of the 24th of March last, and that of the 26th of May last, relating to cattle disease, and every person who shall contravene it shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the provisions of the said before-mentioned Orders of the 24th of March and the 26th of May last, relative to offences, as if the same provisions were here repeated at length; and all the other provisions of the said Orders not inconsistent herewith shall apply to this Order.

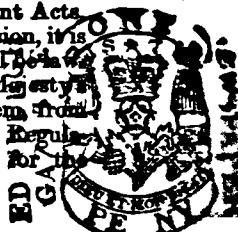

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued until the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, by divers subsequent Acts and lastly by an Act passed in the last session, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary, for the



purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals."

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, known as Variola Ovina or Sheep Pox, prevails among sheep in some parts of England, and has been recently spread therein by sheep imported from Belgium:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council from time to time in relation to the Variola Ovina or Sheep Pox, and it is desirable that certain other regulations should be made in relation to sheep imported into Great Britain from Belgium:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order as follows:—

1. All sheep brought to Great Britain from Antwerp, or any other port in Belgium, and landed in any town or place in Great Britain, shall, within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, be taken to some market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of animals intended for immediate slaughter, if there is any such market within such town or place, and if a market is held there within the said period of four days; but if there is no such market within such town or place, or if no market is held there within the said period of four days, then all such sheep shall be slaughtered in such town or place within the said period of four days.

2. The expression "town or place" in this Order shall have the same meaning as in Regulation 30 of the Order of the 24th day of March last.

3. The word "sheep" shall include lambs; and this Order shall be construed in like manner as that of the 24th March last; and every person who shall contravene it shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the provision of the said Order relative to offences; and all the other provisions of the said Order not inconsistent herewith shall apply to this Order.

4. This Order shall take effect on and after the seventeenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

ABERCORN.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the authority of the Statute passed in the Session of the 11th and 12th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter 107, and divers subsequent Statutes continuing the same, various Orders were made by the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and by three of said Orders bearing date respectively the 7th and 13th September, and 27th November 1865, the removal to any port or place in that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Ireland, from any port or place in that part of the said United Kingdom called Great Britain of skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, was prohibited, save as to hides, skins, and horns brought into Great Britain from India, South America, and Australia, and afterwards removed from Great Britain to Ireland, as in said Orders mentioned:

And whereas by a further Act passed in the Session of the 29th year of Her said present Majesty's reign, chapter 4, it was amongst other things enacted, that the several powers and authorities by the said Acts vested in the Lords and others of Her said Majesty's Privy Council should and might be exercised by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of Her said Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, to whom, with the advice aforesaid, power was thereby given from time to time to make certain Orders and Regulations for the purposes in said several Acts mentioned:

And whereas it has been represented to the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland that the importation of Offal from Scotland to Ireland under proper regulations ought to be permitted;

Now We, James, Marquess of Abercorn, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, do hereby, in exercise of the powers given to Us by the Statutes aforesaid, order as follow:—

1. In this Order the word "Offal" shall mean and include intestines and bladders of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, and swine.

2. From and after the date of the publication of this Order in the Dublin Gazette it shall be lawful to import Offal from that part of Great Britain aforesaid called Scotland into Ireland; and all Offal so imported shall be exempted from the operation of the said in part recited Orders, but shall be so imported subject to the restrictions and conditions hereinafter mentioned and set forth, that is to say:—

The exporter of such Offal shall duly make solemn Declaration in the form annexed to this Order, which Declaration shall be forwarded to the consignee; and no casks containing such Offal shall be delivered to the consignee until he shall have handed over the said Declaration to the Collector of Customs for the port or place at which such Offal shall be landed; and no casks containing such Offal shall be so delivered until the expiration of three days after landing.

No Offal shall be imported from any Scotch port into Ireland except in casks which have been thoroughly whitewashed outside with a solution of quicklime previous to shipment.

The premises containing such imported Offal shall be open to the inspection of an Inspector appointed by the Lord Lieutenant, in pursuance of the said Statutes.

3. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Acts, for every such offence forfeit any sum, not exceeding Twenty Pounds sterling, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

DECLARATION.

COUNTY OF TO WIT.

I, [*Name in full, place of residence, the County or Shire, and the occupation of the exporter to be herein stated,*] do solemnly and sincerely Declare that the Offal intended to be exported by me to [*name in full and place of residence of the consignee to be herein stated,*] is the Offal of animals killed and found fit for human food under the supervision of a duly appointed Inspector, in a regularly licensed slaughter-house in Scotland, and that such Offal has been packed in salt for a period of not less than ninety-three days previous to the time of my now making this Declaration, and to said Offal being shipped, and has been so packed in iron-bound water-tight casks, thoroughly coopered up for at least twenty-one days previous to the time of my now making this Declaration and to the shipment of said Offal.

And I make this solemn Declaration, conscientiously believing the same to be true, and by virtue of the provisions of an Act made and passed in the Sessions of Parliament of the fifth and sixth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to repeal an Act of the present Session of Parliament, intituled, 'An Act for the more effectual abolition of oaths and affirmations taken and made in various departments of the State, and to substitute Declarations in lieu thereof, and for the more entire suppression of voluntary and extra-judicial oaths and affidavits, and to make other provisions for the abolition of unnecessary oaths.'"
