ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Wednesday next, the 20th instant, for Her late Serene Highness The Duchess of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Angustenburg, Second Cousin of Her Majesty the Queen, and Mother of His Royal Highness The Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, Her Majesty's Son-in-Law; viz. :—

The Ladies to wear black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, white Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-rings, black or white Shoes, Fans, and Tippetts.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full-trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, black Swords and Buckles.

The Court to change the Mourning on Saturday the 23d instant; viz. :—

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans, and Tippetts, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuffs, with black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black Coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Wednesday the 27th instant the Court to go out of Mourning.

The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Consul at Geneva, a Despatch, of which the following is an extract :—

" Geneva, March 9, 1867.

" The Cantonal laws positively require the production of passports, or some other certificate, in order to obtain permits of residence in any of the Swiss Cantons; the only persons exempted from the above law are travellers passing through the country, or who may be residing for a few days only in the hotels.

" I have the honour to enclose the text of the Cantonal law on *permits of residence*."

Extract of Inclosure.

" (Law of June 16, 1866.)

" ART. 1er. Toute personne, sans distinction d'âge, de sexe, et de condition, non ressortissant au Canton et y résidant, est soumise à l'obligation de prendre un permis personnel de séjour, ou de domicile, soit d'établissement.

" Le prix de chaque permis est fixé à un franc cinquante centimes par année et par personne, payable d'avance sans fractionnement.

" Les mineurs domiciliés chez leur père ou leur mère sont dispensés de ce paiement jusqu'à l'âge de dix-sept ans.

ART. 2. Tout permis, quel que soit le terme pour lequel il aura été accordé, expire de plein droit, le jour où les papiers déposés par ou pour le non-ressortissant cessent d'être réguliers."
