Ordinance No. 7 of 1838.—An Ordinance to put in force within the garrison and territory of Gibraltar a certain Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, made and passed in the session holden in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the IVth, and in the first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to robbery and stealing from the person."

Ordinance No. 9 of 1838.—An Ordinance to put in force within the garrison and territory of Gibraltar a certain Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, made and passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the IVth, and in the first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to burning or destroying buildings or ships."

Ordinance No. 10 of 1838.—An Ordinance to put in force within the garrison and territory of Gibraltar a certain Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, made and passed in the session holden in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William IVth, and in the first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the law relative to offences punishable by transportation for life."

WHEREAS by the Sanitary Order in Council 1865, it is ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that it should

be lawful for the Sanitary Commissioners to defray out of the "General Sanitary Purpose Rates" the expences therein mentioned, and it is expedient to make provision for raising money by loan to defray such expences as are now, or may hereafter be, chargeable by law on the said rates.

1. It is therefore hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that this Order in Council shall take effect and come into operation forthwith.

2. In citing this Order in Council in other Orders in Council, in local Ordinances, in all Notices and Proclamations published by, or by command of, or by or with the sanction of the Governor, or by the said Sanitary Commissioners, and in all legal instruments and proceedings taken, made, or done in pursuance of or under the authority of this Order in Council, it shall be sufficient to use the words "The Order in Council for 'the raising Capital for 'Public Purposes' in 'Gibraltar, 1867.'"

3. The word "public purposes" shall include every purpose the cost of effecting which is or shall be by law chargeable, in whole or in part, against "The General Sanitary Purposes Rates."

4. The word "capital" shall mean and include every sum of money which the Commissioners may be by law authorised to raise for any public purposes.

5. And in every case in which the amount thereof shall not be expressly declared by law, the word "capital" shall mean and include every sum applicable to such public purpose as aforesaid, an estimate of which shall be made, published, and allowed in manner hereinafter mentioned, unless Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, should be pleased by Order in Council otherwise to order.

6. Every such estimate shall be signed by the person making the same, and shall be certified as being, in the opinion of the Sanitary Commissioners, correct, by the Chairman, under his hand and seal, and shall contain a separate and detailed estimate of the probable cost of the works required to be constructed for the public purpose in question, and also a separate estimate in gross of the probable amount, if any, which may be payable to Her Majesty as owner, and all persons as owners, lessees, or occupiers of premises in Gibraltar which would be required to be taken or used on account of such purchase, for the purpose of, or as compensation for, the use or damage to such premises, and a separate estimate in gross of the probable cost of all accommodation works which may be required (if any).

7. And also a detailed estimate of the probable annual expenditure (interest upon capital excepted) to be occasioned by carrying such public purpose into effect.

8. Every such estimate shall be published on two consecutive days in the Gibraltar Chronicle, or in such other manner as Government Notices are, or usually may be published, and shall, within the period of twenty days after the expiration of one month after the last of such days of publication, be delivered to the Governor, by whom the same shall be transmitted, together with such observations as he may think necessary, to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for the purpose of being submitted to Her Majesty.

9. If Her Majesty shall, at any time within twelve months thereafter, be pleased to sanction and allow such estimate, whether subject to
