REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOMS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing-Room, a Card, with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Drawing-Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing-Rooms, except in accordance with the above Regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing-Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

The Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Notwithstanding anything in any Order of the Privy Council, whether general or relating to any particular port or place, foreign cattle may, from and after the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, be kept alive, within the part of any port defined for the landing and slaughter of such cattle for any time not exceeding ten days after landing, exclusive of the day of landing; and all such cattle shall, from and after the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, be slaughtered within such ten days, whether they are taken to a licensed market or sale within such defined part or not.

2. Notwithstanding anything in Article 46 of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August 1867, the mode of marking sheep, goats, and swine, brought in the same vessel with foreign cattle, shall be such (if any) as the Privy Council from time to time direct.

3. Words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August 1867.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Minister at Madrid two Decrees, issued by the Spanish Government, of which the following are translations:—

MINISTRY OF THE INTERIOR.

ROYAL ORDER.

THE Queen (whom God preserve), desiring to protect as much as possible the interests of commerce and navigation, and having observed, from the official data communicated to Her Majesty's Government by our Spanish Representatives abroad, that the sanitary condition of Europe has considerably ameliorated, has been pleased to order:—

1. That, from the date of the publication of this Royal Order in the Gazette, arrivals from the Empire of Morocco, Melilla, Peñon de la Gomera, Alincemas, Ceuta, Gibraltar, the Hanse Towns, the Canaries, Denmark, and the Pontifical States, be considered clean.

2. Arrivals from France (except Algeria), England, Smyrna, Salonica, Sweden, Norway, Austria, the Adriatic, Russia, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Italy (except Sicily and Calabria), shall for the present be subject to three days' observation.

3. Arrivals from Sicily and Calabria, Greece, Algeria, Tunis, the Ottoman Empire, Fernando Po, Prussia, and America in general, will continue to be considered foul, so long as the present sanitary condition of those places remains unchanged.

4. Ships coming from the European ports included in Rules 1 and 2, shall be treated according to the dispositions of the said rules, always however with the proviso that no accident shall have occurred on board during the voyage, that there be nothing irregular in the ship's papers, bill of health, or roll, and that no symptom be observed which may excite suspicion in the Port Directors and Health Doctors; in the contrary case, those functionaries shall at once consult the General Direction of the Branch, giving as much detail as it is possible to give in a telegram.

ROYAL ORDER.

A ROYAL Order, dated the 1st instant, and published in the Gazette of the 11th, settled the course to be for the present observed with regard to arrivals from the ports and places mentioned in the same, but maintaining the measures previously imposed on arrivals from America, with reference to which country the news received had not been sufficiently satisfactory to warrant any modification which might be compatible with the care necessary for the preservation of public health in our territory.

According to new and recent data received we learn that the sickness which prevailed has disappeared from some of the ports of Europe and America, and is declining in others, and it is therefore indispensable to diminish prudently and

cautiously the preventive measures to which arrivals from those places are subjected, thus helping to render less onerous to commerce and industry the involuntary but inevitable delays consequent upon those measures of severity which are based upon the duty incumbent on the Government to preserve the country from the invasion of epidemic disease.

In consequence of the above, the Queen (whom God preserve) has been pleased to order the following:—

1. Besides the arrivals declared to be clean by the aforesaid Royal Order of 1st instant, arrivals from Russia, France (except Algeria and possessions in Asia and America), all the European ports of Great Britain (except Malta), Smyrna, Salonica, Sweden, Norway, Austria, the Adriatic, Belgium, the Netherlands, Bolivia, Chile, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Peru, Venezuela, and Ecuador, shall also be considered clean, and shall be admitted to free pratique in our ports.

2. Arrivals from Italy (except Sicily and Calabria), Algeria, Prussia, Greece, the Ottoman Empire, and Tunis, shall be subjected to three days of rigorous observation at the lazarets established for the purpose, if they have a clean bill of health and no accident has occurred on board during the voyage. The same observation shall be undergone by arrivals from the Argentine Republic, Philadelphia, New York, Charleston, Baltimore, Boston, Newfoundland, and Labrador; but they shall, at a proper place, fumigate and ventilate ship, cargo, luggage, crew, and passengers, in accordance with that which is ordered in respect to arrivals from Newfoundland, by Royal Order of 11th instant, communicated to you by telegram.

3. Arrivals from Sicily and Calabria, the French Possessions in Asia and America, Malta, Fernando Po, Cuba, P. Rica, New Orleans, Galveston, St Thomas, Mexico, Uruguay, Paraguay, Brazil, and Hayti, shall be considered foul, and be treated accordingly.

4. Should any arrivals, although declared clean, arouse suspicion in the Port Directors on account of accidents on board, the special conditions of the cargo, or any other justifiable motive, before admitting them to free pratique, they shall consult the General Direction of the branch by telegram, in order that a decision may be arrived at as to the treatment to which they are to be subjected.

5. Arrivals, subject to three days' observation, which during the voyage may have had any accident on board, arising from epidemic disease, or under suspicious circumstances, shall be dismissed to a foul lazaret.

With reference to the notice inserted in the London Gazette of Friday last, stating that a Despatch had been received at this department through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Wash-

ington, and in which it was announced that the Bill for the suspension during the present year of the internal tax on cotton had been passed by the American Senate, the Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received a further Despatch from Washington, reporting that the announcement was premature, as the Bill has not yet passed through all its stages.

OFFICIAL NOTICE.

WHEREAS it is provided by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1867," as follows, viz. :—

The Board of Trade shall from time to time issue and cause to be published scales of Medicines and Medical Stores suitable for different ships and voyages, and shall also prepare or sanction a book or books containing instructions for dispensing the same.

The owners of every ship navigating between the United Kingdom and any place out of the same shall provide and cause to be kept on board such ship a supply of Medicines and Medical Stores in accordance with the scale appropriate to the said ship, and also a copy of the said book or of one of the said books containing instructions.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers vested in them by the provisions above recited, the Board of Trade hereby sanction a Book of Instructions for dispensing the Medicines and Medical Stores provided and kept on board ship, intituled "The Ship Captain's Medical Guide," price One Shilling, compiled by Harry Leach, Resident Medical Officer of the "Dreadnought" Hospital Ship, and Inspector of Lime and Lemon Juice appointed by the Board of Trade for the Port of London.

AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST—QUEENSLAND.

Fixed Light at North Head, Port Denison.

The Portmaster of Queensland has given Notice that, from the 23d day of October 1867, the temporary light exhibited on the North Head Islet, Port Denison, would be replaced by a permanent one.

The light is a *fixed white* light, seaward, excepting from between the bearings S. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., and S. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., where it appears as a *red* light; it is elevated 86 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 11 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fifth order.

The lighthouse is hexagonal-shaped, white, and 30 feet high; its position is in lat. $19^{\circ} 59' 53''$ S., long. $148^{\circ} 17' 40''$ East from Greenwich.

Directions.—Vessels coming from the northward, opening the red light, will be in a line with the outer extremity of Cape Edgecumbe; and as soon as they have stood through the red light, and opened out the white light, they may steer in for the north entrance, and while to the eastward of the red light are clear of all the outlying dangers to the eastward of that Cape.

Fixed Light at Gatcombe Head, Port Curtis.

Also that, from the 4th day of October 1867, the temporary light as exhibited on Gatcombe Head, Port Curtis, would be replaced by a permanent one.

The light is a *fixed white* light, seaward, but it will appear *red* from the bearing W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. northward, and also from between the bearings N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. and N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.; it is elevated 66 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fifth order.

The lighthouse is hexagonal-shaped, white, and 30 feet high; its position is in lat. $23^{\circ} 53' 4''$ S., long. $151^{\circ} 23' 45''$ East of Greenwich.

Directions.—Vessels coming from the southward should, while keeping outside the East Bank, in not less than 8 fathoms water, steer to the westward, until the light on Gatcombe Head is seen as a red light; while vessels from the north-

ward should pass into the arc of the red light, and with the red light bearing S.W. by W. steer for it until East Point bears N.W., then steer S.S.W., and open the white light before reaching Settlement Point. When the line of change of colour is reached vessels should keep within the white light, which will lead in, clear of the rocks off Settlement Point; after passing the point, alter course so as to pass outside the Oyster Rock, and as soon as the red light opens bearing N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., being then to the westward of the Junction Buoy, stand across into the South Channel.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation at Port Denison $7^{\circ} 30'$, and at Port Curtis $8^{\circ} 30'$ Easterly, in 1868.]

Fixed Lights on Woody Island, Port of Maryborough, Great Sandy Strait.

The Portmaster of Queensland has given Notice that, from the 1st day of October 1867, lights would be exhibited from two lighthouses recently erected on Woody Island, Port of Maryborough, Great Sandy Strait, one near the North bluff of the island, the other near the Middle bluff.

The *North Bluff* light is a *facel white* light, excepting from between the bearings S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. and W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., where it is a *red* light; it is elevated 130 feet above the level of the sea.

The *Middle Bluff* light is a *facel white* light, excepting from between the bearings S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. and S. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., where it is a *red* light, and is obscured from between the bearings N.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. and N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; it is elevated 215 feet above the level of the sea.

The illuminating apparatus of both lights is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order.

Both lighthouses are hexagonal-shaped, white, and 22 feet high; the Northern is placed four-tenths of a mile from the extreme of Datum Point, 100 yards within the high water line; the Southern is placed on the summit of the Island abreast Middle bluff; they bear from each other S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., distant nearly 2 miles.

These lights are exhibited to enable vessels to enter the port of Maryborough through the West channel, at night.

Directions.—When entering Hervey bay, steer so as to pass one or two miles west of the Fairway buoy, until the two lights on Woody Island are visible and are brought in a line bearing S.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.; steer with the two lights in one past Dayman spit and the Middle bank, until the two lights are nearly on the same level, then look out for the red buoy, which is placed a short distance to the south-west of the line of the lights; on

sighting the *red* buoy steer about E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. (making due allowance for tide) for the red buoy off Woody Island spit (or the north end of Long Middle bank): should the low or North light be the first to appear red, keep upon the edge of the red light until the high light also is red; but if the high light is the first to appear red, steer south until the lower light is also red.

When the lights are seen to become red at the same time, a vessel is about one-third the distance from the spit across the channel;—then steer about S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., and open the white lights, when, if the lower light shows as a white light first, the vessel will be to the eastward of the course, and to the westward if the upper light becomes white first. From thence steer to pass Little Woody and Duck Islands, keeping Little Woody Island open of the latter until the high light is obscured, when the vessel will be abreast the red beacon, she may then steer S.S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. until the light again opens out as a white light, when she will be abreast the red buoy opposite the white cliffs, from which a course must be gradually shaped for the river heads.

In entering with the two lights in one, should the red buoy which denotes the turning point, by any accident not be seen, the vessel may still with safety stand on with the lights in one until the high light is dipped below the northern hill.

Information has been received that the neighbourhood of the bank has lately been closely examined in Her Majesty's ship "Peterel;" but as soundings in 200 fathoms were found at the assigned position, and depths of not less than 130 fathoms within a radius of 5 miles from it, the shoal soundings made in the Spanish ship "Justa" cannot be in the locality named.

A well known bank, with a corresponding depth of water to that obtained by the "Justa," lies to the south-eastward, distant 7 miles from the Cape of Good Hope.
