THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from the Spanish Minister at this Court, a Note, of which the following is a translation, relative to the passports required for travellers proceeding to the Island of Cuba:—

Spanish Legation in London,
February 3, 1868.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Excellency, by direction of my Government, that Her Majesty the Queen, my august Sovereign, taking into consideration the reasons set forth by the Captain-General of the Island of Cuba, has been pleased to order that the Royal Decree of 14th May last, relative to the abolition of passports for Spaniards and Foreigners arriving at that island, shall be temporarily without effect. In consequence thereof, and until otherwise determined, every person who proceeds to the aforesaid Antilla Island will have to be provided with the proper passport from his Government.

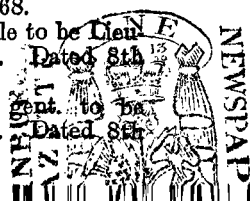
