

IN THE MATTER OF THE FACTORY ACTS  
EXTENSION ACT, 1867.

WHEREAS due proof has been made to the satisfaction of me, the undersigned, Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the customs of the Trades carried on in the Factories specified in the Schedule hereto, require that the children, young persons, and women, working in such Factories, should be employed between the hours hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the said Gathorne Hardy, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the 12th Article of the Schedule annexed to the Factory Acts Extension Act, 1867, do, by this my order, give permission to the occupiers of the said Factories to employ the children, young persons, and women, working in such Factories, between the hours of seven o'clock in the morning and seven o'clock in the evening, or between eight o'clock in the morning and eight o'clock in the evening, instead of between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening, subject to the conditions in the said Act contained.
