The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the fourth section of "The Medical Act," one of the persons to constitute "The General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom" to be established under or by virtue of the provisions of that Act, was to be a person chosen from time to time by the University of Edinburgh and the two Universities of Aberdeen collectively, and by the fifth section of the said Act it was provided that if the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen should not be able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the Council, it should be lawful for each one of the said Universities to select one person, and thereupon it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to appoint one of the persons so selected to be a member of the said Council for the said Universities.

And whereas in the year 1858 the said University of Edinburgh, and the said two Universities of Aberdeen collectively, chose James Syme, Esquire, Professor of Clinical Surgery in the University of Edinburgh, to be their representative in the said General Council for the term of five years; and again, in the year 1863, collectively chose the said James Syme to be their representative in the said General Council for the further term of five years:

And whereas the said two Universities of Aberdeen, in the said Medical Act mentioned, have, since the passing thereof, been consolidated and united into one University, that is to say, the University of Aberdeen:

And whereas, under or by virtue of the provisions of the said Act the said James Syme, on the 19th October 1868, ceased by lapse of time to be a member of the said General Council:

And whereas the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen have not been able to agree upon some one person to represent them in the said General Council, and, in pursuance of the said fifth section of the said Act, the said University of Edinburgh hath selected the said James Syme, and the said University of Aberdeen hath selected John Macrobin, M.D., Professor of the Practice of Medicine in the University of Aberdeen, and Dean of the Medical Faculty, and have submitted the names of the said two persons to Her Majesty in Council:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth, under and by virtue of the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Medical Act, appoint the said John Macrobin, M.D., to be a member of the said General Council for the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen for the term of five years from the date hereof.
