THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby revoke their Orders bearing date the twentieth day of August one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and the nineteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, relating to sheep brought to Great Britain which come from the Continent of Europe; provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Orders before the date of this revocation, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under the said Orders, or either of them.

This revocation shall take effect on Friday the twenty-sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.
