Extract of a letter from the Earl of ST VINCENT, K. B. Admiral of the White, &c. to EVAN NEPEAN, Efq. dated in Torbay, the 2d instant.

I inclose, for their Lordships information, a letter which I have received from Capt: Lukin, of his Majesty's ship Thames, informing me of the capture of L'Aurore French national corvette, of sixteen guns, charged with dispatches from the Mauritius, and a letter from Capt. Halliday, of the Doris, giving an account of the capture of the brig La Favorite.

My Lord, Thames, at fea, Jan. 19. 1801.

I have the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that on the 18th inft. his Majesty's ship I command captured the French national ship corvette L'Aurore, of sixteen guns, commanded by Charles Girault, Lieutenant de Vaisseau: She was from the Mauritius, having on board the Aid-de-Camp to the Governor of that place, charged with dispatches to the French Government.—I have the honour to be, &c.

My LORD, Doris, Jan. 23, 1801.
Since the evening of the 20th, when I had the honour of communicating to your Lordship the fortunate capture we had made of the French ship Le Huron, I have been cruising, agreeably to my orders, and have this morning captured the French brig La Favorite, from L'Orient, bound to Bourdeaux, laden with staves, copper, and hides .- I have the honour to be, &c.

King, of his Majesty's ship Sirius, giving an account of the capture of the Charlotta Spanish letter of marque.

ST VINCENT.

Sirius, off Cape Belem, Jan. 28. 1801.

My Lord, I beg leave to inform your Lordship, his Ma-jesty's ship Sirius, under my command, in com-pany with his Majesty's ship Amethyst, captured the Spanish letter of marque Charlotta, from Ferrol, bound to Curacao, out of Ferrol only fixteen hours, Cape Belem bearing S. by W. fix or feven leagues.

Copy of a letter from Vice Admiral Lord Hugh Sey-mour, Commander in Chief of his Majefty's ships and vessels at Jamaica, to EVAN NEVEAN, Elq. dated the 21st of December 1800.

I beg you will lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the inclosed copy of a letter which I yesterday received from Captain Halkett, of his Majesty's ship Apollo.

His Majesty's ship Apollo, Dec. 1800. My Lord,

At noon, on the 10th ult, in the Gulf of Mexico, in lat. 21 deg. N. we gave chace to a xebec to windward of us, but foon after difcovering a brig directly in the wind's eye, we chaced her, and at two in the morning, got up and took possession of the Resolution sloop of war of eighteen guns, and one hundred and forty-nine men, commanded by Don Francisco Oarrichena (formerly the Resolution cutter in the British Navy); she failed from Vera Cruz three days before.

As foon as her crew were removed to this

ship, we made all fail, and an hour after daybreak got fight again of the xebec, and captured her at three o'clock in the afternoon; she is from Vera Cruz, and was bound to the Havan-

The Resolution was in general towed by us until the 27th ult. when her main-malt went by the board; an attempt was made to refit her, but her rigging and fails being perfectly rotten, and every thing belonging to her in fuch a a milerable condition, it was necessary to destroy her.

On the 7th inst. off Porcillo, in the island of

Cuba, we re-captured the schooner St Joseph.
